RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Staff recommends that the City Council conduct a public hearing to receive information from staff and comments from the public, and then:

1. Adopt a resolution certifying the Environmental Impact Report for the New Zoo at Elk Grove Project, adopting Findings of Fact, and a

Statement of Overriding Considerations and a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (Attachment 1).

- 2. Introduce and waive the full reading, by substitution of title only, an Ordinance establishing the Zoological Park Special Planning Area and rezoning certain property (Attachment 2).
- 3. Adopt a Resolution amending the Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails approving a Conditional Use Permit, Master Plan, Subdivision Map with Subdivision Design Review. District Development Plan, Level 1 Design Review, an Art Plan, and making a determination of consistency with the General Plan for listing in the City's Capital Improvement Program for the New Zoo at Elk Grove Project (Attachment 3).

Staff also recommends that the City Council:

- 4. Adopt a Resolution providing a compelling reason to deviate from the current guidelines of the City's Naming Policy and create an alternative process for naming New Zoo buildings (Attachment 4).
- 5. Review and provide feedback, as necessary, on financing terms with the Sacramento Zoological Society for financing Phases 1A and 1B of the New Zoo at Elk Grove Project.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The New Zoo at Elk Grove Project (SP0009) (the "Project"), involves the construction of a new zoological park and associated facilities and activities on an approximately 103-acre site at the northwest corner of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway.

The zoological park would include various facilities and buildings to be developed in phases. The main facility would be on approximately 65 acres and would be designed to support an average annual attendance of between 1.1 and 1.6 million visitors at buildout. The facility would be organized into four primary zones: Green Corridor, Africa, California, and Australasia. The Green Corridor would be the main pedestrian pathway through the New Zoo.

Components of the Project include:

- Adoption of a new **Zoological Park Special Planning Area** to establish zoning regulations (development standards, allowed uses, required permits), and rezoning of the site.
- Amendment of the Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails Master Plan to reflect the updated pedestrian and bicycle facilities around the Project.
- A Conditional Use Permit for the operation of a zoological park. Components and features include, but are not limited to, the keeping of animals and insects, veterinary care, educational activities, food and beverage service (inclusive of alcohol service, including limited on-site brewing of beer), retail sales, administrative offices, caretaker's quarters, greenhouses/gardens/nurseries, and warehousing and storage of goods and materials for on-site usage. This also includes overnight accommodations (hotel/motel and patron/guest camping) and special events and programs where the facilities are either provided as a special ticketed event or are available for rent.
- A Tentative Subdivision Map with Subdivision Design Review to subdivide the site into seven parcels and to set aside public right-ofway for public streets and other utilities, as well as the dedication of easements for public utilities.
- A **District Development Plan**, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, establishing the overall site plan, parking/access/circulation, and major components of the Project.

- Level 1 Design Review, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, approving building design and architecture for the Entry Complex, Giraffe Café/Lodge, and Animal Care Center/Nutrition Center/Gelada Café.
- An Art Plan, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, providing a process for integration of public art into the Project, including establishing a budget for the purchase and installation of art and the process to solicit, select, and install the artwork.
- A Financing Plan for the Project.

PROJECT SETTING

The Project site (Assessor's Parcel Numbers [APNs] 132-0320-010, -001 and -002; and 132-2390-006) is located at the northwest intersection of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway in the City of Elk Grove. The Project site is a fallow field surrounded by single-family residences to the east, agriculture to the south and west, and active construction of a new residential subdivision to the north. Historically, the Project site was used as rangeland for cattle from April to December. The Project site is within the Livable Employment Area (LEA) Community Plan and the core of the site has a land use designation of Parks and Open Space. The LEA Community Plan includes consideration of the Project site as a zoological park.

Table 1 lists the uses adjacent to the project site. **Figure 1** shows the location of the Project.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

In 1927, the City of Sacramento consolidated several public and private animal collections and established the Sacramento Zoo in Land Park. Over the following decades, the facility was expanded from an initial 4.2 acres to the current 14.7 acres. The existing facility hosts more than 500,000 visitors annually and, as of 2024, includes 380 animals across 94 species. In 1997, the City of Sacramento transferred operation of the facility to the non-profit Sacramento Zoological Society (the Society). The facilities (e.g., buildings) continue to be owned by the City of Sacramento; much of the animal collection is on loan from other zoos across the country or is owned by the Society, while a small number of animals are owned by the City of Sacramento. The Zoo operates as an accredited institution under the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA).

The Zoo is at risk of losing its AZA accreditation, as many of the animal habitats do not conform with modern design standards. Multiple species have been transferred out of the facility so that existing habitats can be merged or reconfigured. For example, in 2018, the tigers were transferred out and their habitat was merged with the adjoining lion habitat to provide the lions with more space.

On multiple occasions, the City of Sacramento and the Society have studied expansion of the existing facility or relocation to other sites within the City of Sacramento. Expansion of the Land Park site has been deemed infeasible due to impacts to other facilities in the park, compatibility with the adjoining residential neighborhood, and availability of parking. No alternative site has

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been selected by the City of Sacramento. Without a viable relocation or expansion of the existing Zoo, the facility would most likely lose its accreditation or would be forced to continue relocating animals, thereby reducing the number of animal species, and impacting the visitor attraction and viability of the operation.

Following relocation discussions with the City of Sacramento in 2020, the Society approached the City of Elk Grove (City) to discuss opportunities that may exist for the Zoo in Elk Grove. In September 2021, the City and the Society executed an Exclusive Negotiation Agreement (ENA), requiring the two parties to only work with each other relative to relocation of the Zoo. Additionally, the City began investigating approximately ±100-acres along the north side of Kammerer Road and west of Lotz Parkway as a potential Zoo site, with the City Council directing acquisition (Resolution) of the site in February 2022. On April 8, 2022, the City acquired the property. As discussed later in this report, this site has sufficient acreage and access to support the Zoo.

In March 2022, the City Council received a Feasibility Study, along with a Financial Impact Analysis, for the development of a Zoo in Elk Grove, replacing the Land Park facility. The Study and Analysis concluded that development of a Zoo in Elk Grove was potentially viable, subject to the financial assumptions and site program considered in the reports. Based upon these results, the Council directed staff to continue working with the Society on the Project. In May 2022, the City and the Society entered into (Resolution) a Memorandum of Understanding, outlining the activities, responsibilities, and outcomes of the next phase of work: developing a design plan for the potential zoo, along with a financing plan and environmental impact report. At the conclusion of this phase, the City Council would consider approving the Project, allowing it to move forward to construction, pending the terms of the Financing Plan.

PLANNING COMMISSION REVIEW:

The Planning Commission reviewed this Project at their regular meeting on April 4, 2024. After receiving staff's presentation and hearing from the Society, the Commission received public comment. Eleven comments were received, with nine of them supporting the Project. At the conclusion of the public hearing, Commission members identified various elements of the Project that they found important and beneficial to the City, and ultimately voted 5-0 to recommend approval to the City Council.

Staff will note that during the presentation, the Commission asked about the feasibility of including a condition of approval that would require the Project to have a dedicated person(s), with published contact information, that would be a single point of contact to address neighbor concerns, including sound/noise, traffic, light, and other operational conditions. The Society did not have concerns with this condition. However, the Commission did not include the condition in their action. Staff believes this was an oversight and agrees with the benefits such a condition would have for the community. Therefore, the attached conditions of approval include this condition (COA #21).

ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION:

The proposed Project has been reviewed in accordance with the City's General Plan, as well as other relevant City goals and programs. As it proposes the establishment of a new Special Planning Area (SPA) and creating new zoning regulations for the site, the content of that SPA is described below; the consistency of the Project to the SPA is then provided.

General Plan and Other City Goals

Consideration for development of a zoo in Elk Grove can be viewed from several vantage points. In the most immediate sense, zoos provide opportunity for conservation and education about animals and their habitats by introducing the community to these species and helping to foster an appreciation of the natural world. Most people will not travel to the African savanna or Australian Outback to view animals in their natural habitat, so having the opportunity to experience these animals in the local community provides immediate accessibility. These educational opportunities can extend into classroom programs, both at the K-12 levels and in higher education. On an annual basis, the Sacramento Zoo hosts over 35,000 school-age children as part of various educational programs, including field trips, zoo mobiles, summer camp, and group overnights. More than 700 schools across the region visit the Zoo each year, and the Zoo and UC Davis enjoy a unique partnership that helps to make UC Davis's Veterinary Science program one of the best in the world.

At a social level, zoos provide a recreational activity for area residents and visitors. According to the AZA, more than 183 million people visit zoos and aquariums in the United States annually – more than attend NFL, NBA, NHL, and MLB games combined. In the 2021 National Community Survey, only 43% of Elk Grove residents rated the City favorably as having opportunities for activities and events. The need for more family-oriented activities is a frequent resident comment.

A zoo could address some of the City's broader goals and priorities. In 2023, the Council reviewed, updated, and affirmed its Mission, Vision, and Goals. A zoo furthers the first goal (Vibrant Community), which is provided below, because it involves the attraction and expansion of a non-profit business to the community with substantial capital investment, is an opportunity to increase tax revenues in the City (see discussion later in this report) and would enhance the experiences available to residents and visitors. Further, it would be the intent of the Society and the City that the design and character of the facility would be of the highest standard.



• A vibrant community and sustainable economy with diverse businesses and amenities

- o Facilitate business attraction, retention, and expansion efforts that maximize employment, capital investment, and tax revenues, reduce barriers, and that promote equity and inclusion in entrepreneurship.
- o Facilitate development of enhanced retail, dining, arts and entertainment, hospitality projects and experiences that serve residents and visitors.
- o Ensure public and private development that is high-quality and attractive, contributing to a sense of place.
- o Plan and facilitate development of neighborhoods of varying densities and characteristics - from rural to suburban to urban.
- Support efforts that further a resilient business community.

The Zoo would also address the City's economic development-specific goals and focus areas, including:

- Lifestyle Amenities: Facilitate attraction and development of increased and enhanced lifestyle amenities (retail, dining, entertainment, nightlife, recreational, and public amenities) that will improve quality of life for residents and employees.
- <u>Visitation:</u> Position Elk Grove as a competitive location for business and personal travel and visitation.
- Marketing and Branding: Develop and deploy a robust business brand, creative properties, and marketing materials that distinguishes Elk Grove and positions it as an exceptional location for business and visitation.
- Regional Leadership: Position Elk Grove as a driving force in regional economic development decision making and business attraction

efforts through enhanced branding and marketing and building and leveraging relationships with key agencies.

On a land planning level, the approval and development of a zoo in Elk Grove, and specifically at the proposed site, is consistent with the City's General Plan. The Vision Statement of the General Plan provides that Elk Grove is a "great place to make a home, a great place to work, and a great place to play" and describes the community as being "family-oriented" and plentiful in parks. General Plan Goal RC-1 notes that "Elk Grove aims to become a center within the larger region, providing opportunities for employment, recreation, education, retail, industry, and residential development." This objective aligns with regional goals for economic development, sustainability and resiliency, and quality of life. Accompanying Policy RC-1-3 provides that Elk Grove should invest in public infrastructure, including developing "great public spaces including urban plazas and parks, and adequate community services." Policy CIF-5-1 provides that "community facilities should be planned and designed to provide services and programs available for residents." The proposed Zoological Park implements the General Plan Vision and the noted goal and policies as it provides for a family-oriented activity in a park-like environment and expands the range of community services and amenities.

Additionally, the proposed Project site is located on a site designated as Park and Open Space in the General Plan and the underlying LEA Community Plan. This designation was applied in December 2023 as part of the adoption of the LEA Community Plan. Prior to this action, the site was within the Southeast Policy Area (SEPA) Community Plan with a land use designation of office and industrial (where a zoo was allowed upon approval of a conditional use permit). The Project is consistent with the current General Plan designation of Park and Open Space as zoos function as a type of park.

Zoological Park Special Planning Area

Early in the master planning process for the proposed New Zoo, staff analyzed the existing zoning regulations to see how they would be applicable to the Project. At the time, the site was within the SEPA Community Plan and accompanying SEPA SPA. While the zoning in place at that time allowed for a zoological park upon approval of a conditional use permit, there were concerns identified regarding the development standards and permitting process for a zoo. Those regulations are structured for traditional commercial development, such as an office building or a research and development campus, where streets are established through the subdivision process and each building goes through a design review. Staff considered working within this system, but, ultimately, the regulations were seen as a poor fit for the

Project. Specific conditions such as parking standards, landscape requirements, access limitations, design standards, and, most importantly, the approval process, were challenges that would have required extensive management and potentially deviations from standards.

With the adoption of the LEA Community Plan in December 2023, new zoning regulations for the site and the larger LEA area are necessary. Staff considered incorporating requirements for the Project into that forthcoming SPA but ultimately decided that a stand-alone document was better given the timeframe necessary to complete the LEA SPA (public review on that document began in March 2024 and consideration by Planning Commission and City Council is not scheduled until later this year).

A SPA is a special purpose zoning district. It is adopted into the City's zoning regulations (within Title 23, Zoning, of the Elk Grove Municipal Code [EGMC]) by reference, with the document itself being uncodified (not published within the text of the EGMC). The SPA tool allows the City to establish unique and imaginative planning standards and regulations that otherwise could not be provided through the application of the City's standard zoning districts. A SPA must include the following minimum components:

- A list of permitted, conditionally permitted, and prohibited uses.
- Performance and development requirements relating to yards, lot area, intensity of development on each lot, parking, landscaping, and signs.
- Other design standards appropriate for the specific site and development.
- Reasons for establishment of the SPA land use zone on the particular property.

A SPA may also include a number of optional components, including but not limited to the following:

- Regulations relating to nonconforming lots, uses, structures, and signs.
- Time, phasing, and sequence of development projects.
- Infrastructure plan.
- Circulation plan.

SPAs are a useful tool for regulating special conditions or circumstances. They can provide unique development standards, approval processes, and can provide deviations from other City regulations (e.g., City Improvement Standards). However, in some instances a SPA may be silent on a particular

matter, in which case the user is directed to the Citywide zoning regulations or other standards. For example, while a SPA may describe the minimum parking requirements for a particular use, which could deviate from the required ratio in the Citywide zoning, none of the City's SPAs specifically provide the standards for parking lot design (e.g., stall and drive aisle dimensions), referring to the Citywide zoning.

The proposed Zoological Park SPA is organized into the following chapters:

- Chapter 1: Introduction This chapter gives a brief description of the overall objective and function of the SPA.
- 2. Chapter 2: Land Use Plan Chapter 2 establishes the land use plan for the SPA, defines the particular SPA Districts, and establishes the allowed uses and activities in each of the Districts.
- 3. Chapter 3: Development Standards and Design Plan This chapter establishes the applicable development standards for development of the Project, including setbacks, height limits, parking, landscaping, lighting, signage, and other components.
- 4. Chapter 4: Design Plan and Guidelines Chapter 4 establishes provisions for the design (look and feel) of the Project, including both design standards and design guidelines.
- 5. Chapter 5: Public Infrastructure This chapter outlines the required public improvements necessary to serve the Project, including circulation, water, sewer, storm drainage, and dry utilities. Specifically, it specifies roadway design requirements for all public streets.
- 6. Chapter 6: Administration and Implementation Finally, Chapter 6 provides for the administration and implementation of this SPA and addresses the process for approval of subsequent design and development plans.

Three Districts make up the SPA, which are described below and shown in **Figure 2**.

- The Zoo District: The Zoological Park itself.
- The Parking District: Provides for the guest and employee parking areas.
- The Public Resources District: Provides for the detention basin serving the SPA and the Shed C Channel along the northern edge of the site.

Notable development standards provided in Chapter 3 of the SPA include:

- Setback and height standards are divided between the Zoo and Parking District and are shown in **Table 2**. These standards are substantially similar to other development in the City; however, specific flexibility is provided along Lotz Parkway based upon the adjacency of residential uses and the detention basin in Sterling Meadows, along with the needs of the overall site design, as discussed later in this report.
- Parking for guests visiting the Zoological Park shall be provided at the following rates:

- 1 parking space for each 1,000 persons of estimated annual attendance; or
- 1 parking space for each three people at peak hour presence; and
- o A minimum of 1,600 parking spaces.
- Bicycle parking shall be provided at a minimum rate of five percent (5%) of the number of provided guest vehicle parks spaces.
- Fencing must comply with the requirements of the US Department of Agriculture for the housing of warm-bodied animals. Along the exterior of the Zoo, fencing must be a minimum of eight feet tall. Along public frontages (Lotz Parkway, Classical Way, and B Drive) fencing must be of a high-quality aesthetic, including concrete masonry block and preformed concrete panels. Along the Shed C Channel, chain link with vinal slats, concrete masonry block, or preformed concrete panels are allowed.
- Various forms of signage are allowed, including:
 - Entry signage, of no more than one per entry, measuring a maximum of 150 square feet of sign area and 20 feet tall.
 - Major identification signage, one each at the intersections of Classical Way and Lotz Parkway and Classical Way and B Drive, with a maximum area of 250 square feet of sign area and 30 feet tall.
 - Building signage at a maximum area of 2.5 square feet for each one lineal foot of building frontage for a maximum of 250 square feet of signage per building.

Chapter 6 provides for a unique approval process for the Project. Traditionally, each building in a development that is more than 1,000 square feet would be subject to the City's Design Review process. For a development as large and complex as the Zoo, with multiple phases, staff has developed an alternative process:

- Approval of the overall site plan, including the configuration of parking facilities, pedestrian spaces, building sites, animal habitats, back of house and utility areas, and the strategy for landscaping, lighting, shade structures, and other physical attributes about the site requires approval of a **District Development Plan**. The approval authority is the City Council.
- Design review for individual buildings is divided based upon the type of building as follows:
 - Level 1 Design Review, which is subject to City Council approval, is required for "major buildings and facilities that reflect on the overall design character and quality of the Zoological complex. This includes, but is not limited to, the Entry Complex, dining facilities larger than 1,000 square feet, Animal Care Center/Nutrition Center, Education Building, Administration (permanent buildings only), and Tent Camp/lodging buildings."
 - Level 2 Design Review is for secondary buildings and facilities that support the overall operation of the Zoological Park. This includes, but is not limited to, modular offices, animal barns and holding facilities, shop buildings, life support system buildings, freestanding restroom buildings, party/classrooms buildings, and accessory retail and food buildings (e.g., beer garden). Because of the smaller nature of these buildings, and the fact that they may be added at various points in time, the Development Services Director is the designated approving authority for Level 2 Design Review.

The SPA also requires that prior to the issuance of the first building permit for any signs at the zoo, a Sign Program must be prepared and approved. The Sign Program shall detail the size, location, and design characteristics (e.g., colors, lettering, materials, sign typology, illumination, construction details) of major and minor signage across the site. The Sign Program shall create a uniform design for signage across the Zoological Park. The approving authority for the Sign Program is the Development Services Director.

Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails Master Plan Amendment


As discussed later in this report, various bicycle and pedestrian facilities are proposed around and leading to the Project site. To reflect these improvements, the Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails Master Plan would be amended as illustrated in **Figure 3**. These revisions are consistent with the General Plan's Transportation Plan (Figures 3-6 and 3-7) as amended in December 2023. More details regarding these improvements are described in the section on Access, Circulation, and Parking, but the changes can be summarized as follows:

- Eliminating the Class 1 trail along the south side of the Shed C Channel along the Zoo site.
- Adding a Class 1 trail along the west side of Lotz Parkway from Shed C to Kammerer Road, and along B Drive from Classical Way to Kammerer Road.
- Adding a Class 4 facility parallel to B Drive from the Shed C Channel to Classical Way, and along the north side of Classical Way from B Drive to Lotz Parkway.

These changes will provide substantial bicycle and pedestrian connectivity to the Project site.

The Trails Committee reviewed the Project and the proposed changes at their August 21, 2023, meeting and their feedback has been incorporated into the Project design.

Zoo Design (District Development Plan, Level 1 Design Review, and Tentative Subdivision Map)

Historically, zoos have been designed to showcase a single animal species at each exhibit, and similar animals (e.g., cats) were shown in a single row. Modern zoos are trending towards multispecies habitats and presenting animals based upon their geographical origin (e.g., Africa). This modern approach has been a foundational principle for designing the Project. Three "lands" were identified early in the design process:

- Africa
- California
- Australia/Asia, or Australasia

Next, the design team considered a number of options for the spatial organization of the site. Key considerations that informed the site plan included:

• Overall access to the site and connectivity with surrounding neighborhoods and future development.

- Limiting impacts to the adjoining Sterling Meadows neighborhood to the east.
- Ensuring that construction of the site could be phased in a logical way as funding is made available.
- Providing sufficient parking for the maximum attendance possible. The
 existing Land Park facility has no dedicated parking and on peak days
 guests must travel extensive distances across the park to access the
 Zoo, often impacting the surrounding residential neighborhood.
- Guest experiences and paths of travel that are logical and present immersive views into animal habitats.

Ultimately, the following design decisions were made:

- 1. The on-site design would utilize a "Main Street" concept (see **Figure 4**) where a central pedestrian spine runs down the length of the site. Different exhibit zones (e.g., Africa, California, etc.) would then loop off and back onto the central spine. This spine has taken on the name "Green Zone" as it features landscaping and aquatic elements with a lush, green character.
- The Green Zone would terminate in a discovery/fun zone that includes a carousel, train ride, play area, dining opportunity, and the animal care center.
- 3. Internal services for the Zoo would be provided through a "ring road" between the habitats and the exterior fencing. This would separate utility and service activities from the guest spaces, increasing visitor safety and allowing for more intimate interactions with the animals.

4. Outside the Zoo:

- a. Classical Way would be extended across the site east-to-west, integrating the site with the Sterling Meadows neighborhood on the east and the future urban development on the Livable Employment Area to the west.
- b. Parking would be provided in two lots located north and south of Classical Way, as described later in this report.
- c. Pedestrian and bicycle connectivity would be provided from trails/corridors that extend north/south along either side of the Zoo, connecting with Sterling Meadows, the Southeast Planning Area, the Shed C trail corridor, and the future trail corridor along

Kammerer Road. These trails and corridors would connect and bring guests directly to the entry of the Zoo along a "City Walk."

For financing and Project complexity reasons, the development of the site has been broken down into four phases:

- Phase 1 of the Project would involve construction of the Green Corridor and Africa. However, specific animal habitats within these zones may themselves be phased depending on Project funding. Phase 1A would include the base Zoo footprint and Phase 1B would include additional zoological features as shown on the Project plans. Phase 1C would include the hippopotamus and additional savannas in the northwest corner of the site.
- Phase 2 of the Project would include the California zone with exhibits at the southeast portion of the site. The California zone would include restrooms, a possible rehab and rescue facility, as well as a building for changing exhibits and an education building (e.g., classrooms, presentation spaces, offices, lecture space, or other activities that align




Figure 5: Buildout Site Plan Overview




Figure 8: Key Map and Zoom-In for Phases 1A & 1B







Figure 8B: Area B

- with the educational programs of the Project). Additional overnight guest accommodations may also be included, with views into the animal habitats and holding areas.
- Phase 3 would consist of construction of a permanent administration office building, replacing the modular buildings constructed in Phase 1. The Administration building would be located between the California zone and the entry complex. The building(s) would be no more than three stories tall.
- Phase 4, the Australasia zone, would be located north of the Animal Care building near the northeast corner of the site. Additional overnight guest accommodations may also be included, with views into the animal habitats and holding areas.

Within each of the phases, sub-phasing may also occur. For example, Phase 1 has already been divided into 1A, 1B, and 1C. While approvals for the overall site design are proposed at this time, the current focus is on the constructability of Phases 1A and 1B. Phases 1A and 1B provide the core elements of the Project and are viable facilities for opening day.

Other notable elements of the site design include the following:

- Three restaurants/dining options are included in the site.
 - The "Gelada Café" adjoins the Animal Care Center (vet and nutrition) and provides typical zoo food options for families.
 - The Beer Garden/Ice Cream area, located between the South Savannah and the Cheetah habitat, provides for light refreshments, and can serve as a rentable space for small events.
 - The "Giraffe Café/Lodge" near the main entrance. This facility includes a restaurant that is available to people both inside the Zoo (with a ticket) and those outside (without a ticket). The restaurant provides views across the savannah, with the lion kopje in the background. It also includes an event space for approximately 500 people, either on a lawn or under a pavilion structure.
- Multiple overnight accommodations are provided in the Project.
 - A lawn area, located between the rhino habitat and the carousel, provides space for family campouts (recreational-style tents), with programing similar to the Zoo's existing <u>overnight safari</u> program.

A series of overnight suite cabins are proposed at various locations around the site. Some are directly attached to a habitat, such as at the giraffe barn or at the lion habitat, while others are freestanding and provide views out across the rhino or hippo habitats. Similar suites may occur in the California and Australasia zones as those phases are designed.

Educational facilities include:


- A dedicated entry for school groups, separate from the main gate and the Giraffe Café entries.
- An education lawn area for introduction of school groups to the site, with space for storage of group materials, including lunches.
- o In Phase 1, classroom space is provided near the gelada habitat and doubles as rentable space for parties or group functions.
- In Phase 2, a dedicated education building is provided in the California zone.

Based upon the overall site plan, staff proposes to subdivide the site into seven parcels, along with the reservation of public right-of-way for Lotz Parkway, Classical Way, B Drive, and Kammerer Road, along with the drainage facilities of the detention basin and the Shed C Channel.

In addition to the images provided in this report and the Project plans provided in Attachment 3 Exhibit C, the Design Team has also prepared a digital 3D model of Phases 1A/1B. This model helps to visualize the relationship of the site elements and provides a platform to resolve viewshed conflicts, operational concerns, and address other issues that may be identified. This model has been provided to the Franklin High School Full Stack Developer Club who, in partnership with the Design Team and the City, has augmented the model with animals and built a website for the public to view and interact with the design. The model can be accessed from the www.elkgrovecity.org/zoomodel. This academic Citv's website at partnership between the City and the Franklin High students is an implementation effort of the City's Smart City Plan.

Access, Circulation, and Parking

The following section describes the access, circulation, and parking configuration planned for the Project. **Figure 9** provides a visual illustration of this information.



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Access to the Project is provided from the extension of Classical Way west from Lotz Parkway. East of Lotz Parkway, Classical Way exists as a twolane residential street. The extension would, at build-out of the Project and surrounding uses, be constructed as a four-lane road. The intersection of Classical Way and Lotz Parkway, as well as two other intersections west of Lotz Parkway, are designed as roundabouts. This intersection design was chosen to provide efficient turning movements as vehicles arrive to the site. The average visitor is anticipated to take Highway 99 south from Sacramento, exit onto Kammerer Road, then turn right onto Lotz Parkway. Upon completion of the Kammerer Road extension, access from Interstate 5 will also be an option. From Lotz Parkway, the roundabout at Classical Way is designed to provide an efficient opportunity for the left turn onto Classical Way. Two additional roundabouts are planned at the main driveway into the Zoo parking lots, as well as at the far western edge of the site where Classical Way will intersect with B Drive, a future street that extends south from the Souza Dairy development north of the Shed C Channel.

The roundabout concept was also selected because of the increased safety this intersection design provides. As noted by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS), roundabouts are safer for pedestrians because they only have to cross one direction of vehicular traffic at a time and the vehicle speeds traveling through the intersection are slower.

Pedestrian and bicycle access to the site is provided by an extension of the sidewalk and trail systems from the north and east. This includes:

- Development of a 40-foot-wide landscape corridor along the Project frontage of Lotz Parkway, developed with a 10-foot-wide trail with decomposed granite shoulders and landscaping.
- A pedestrian sidewalk and a separated bicycle trail (referred to as a Class 4 bike facility) along B Drive.
- Sidewalk and bicycle facilities along Classical Way (to be installed in phases as development occurs to the west).
- The "City Walk" along the entrance to the Zoo, between the north parking lot and the entry gates.

Bicycle parking is provided in two lots, one at the main entrance and a second at the Giraffe Café. In total, 120 bicycle parking spaces are provided, or about 5 to 7% of the total vehicle parking.

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As noted, the Project includes two automobile parking lots. A minimum of 1,600 stalls are planned at build-out. The north parking lot, with approximately 530 stalls, is directly adjacent to the Zoo and Giraffe Café entrance. Based upon an analysis of the average daily visitors at the existing Sacramento Zoo and factoring in increases in attendance as a result of having a dedicated parking lot and expanded campus, this parcel is anticipated to meet the needs of visitors for approximately 75% of the operating days of the year. Therefore, this lot is planned to include all of the necessary ADA parking spaces, as well as the required electric vehicle parking infrastructure.

A second lot, to the south of Classical Way, is planned to meet the needs of the other 25% of the operating days. It includes approximately 1,090 stalls. Because of the reduced demand for this parking facility, and for cost reasons, this parcel is intended to be developed as a gravel-paved lot, rather than as a traditional parking lot with paving and extensive landscaping. This parcel will also serve as the parking area for school buses during school trips.

Between the north parking lot and the guest entry gates is a drop-off zone (the "City Walk"). Guests arriving by bus (typically school groups), transportation network company (or TNC, e.g., Lyft, Uber), or needing special accommodations with closer access to the entry (e.g., disabled access drop-off, family drop-off) can arrive along this curb and easily disembark. Separate drop-off zones are provided for the main entry, education entry, and the Giraffe Café. This area can also provide for valet service during special events at the Giraffe Café. The drop-off zone is a one-way drive lane that connects from the driveway at Classical Way to the exit on B Drive. Drivers looking to return to the curb or return to one of the parking lots would need to go south on B Drive and turn east on Classical Way. Roadway and intersection design has accounted for this needed capacity.

Service access to the Project is provided from several gated driveways. Deliveries for human food and products for the gift shop will arrive at a driveway on B Drive, just north of the parking lot. Product will be unloaded at the Giraffe Café, with most materials stored here. As needed, the product will be delivered to the gift shop (at the main entrance), the Gelada Café, the Beer Garden, and other locations via cart. Deliveries for animal operations will arrive at a new driveway along Lotz Parkway, between the Shed C Channel and the Bilby Road intersection. This driveway will include a new left-turn in/out access. Deliveries at this location include animal food, maintenance and operational equipment, certain human food products arriving at the Gelada Café, and the animals themselves. Additional service

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driveways are located along Lotz Parkway at the intersections of Bilby Road and Overture Way, though these are primarily for emergency access. An additional gate is provided near the main guest entrance along the driveway extending from Classical Way.

In the early phases of the Project, employees will park onsite. Parking areas are provided near the main entry and at the administration center. As the site builds out, the Project anticipates possible acquisition of the former Fire Station site at Lotz Parkway and Overture Way in Sterling Meadows (east side of Lotz Parkway). This parcel would be developed with a fenced employee parking lot. Employees would then cross Lotz Parkway at a signalized intersection and enter at the Overture Way gate. The timing of this improvement is not likely until either Phase 3 or 4 of the Project. The site remains owned by the Cosumnes Community Services District and would require further steps prior to the City being able to purchase said property.

Guest Experience

Two overarching objectives for the Project design have been considered. The first is the care and safety of the animals within their habitats and holding spaces. The second has been focused on the guest experiences. In many respects these two objectives go hand-in-hand. For example, to the extent feasible, habitats have been designed for multi-species occupancy so that guests can experience a more natural habitat and see the interactions of the animals. Examples of this include the savannah, which includes giraffe and other hoof stock/ungulates, and the Gelada habitat, which includes Gelada monkeys and klipspringer. While multispecies habitats are not possible for the carnivores, the placement of their habitats has been considered such that they can be viewed in the distance in relation to the herbivores. An example of this is the lion kopje that is just north of the savannah.

Within the animal habitats themselves, viewing opportunities have been carefully planned. Holding and care quarters have been screened with berms and landscaping to the extent feasible (e.g., see the Giraffe barn and how it is screened from the savannah). Multiple viewing angles are provided for all habitats so that guests have multiple opportunities to see the animals. The location and condition of these viewing opportunities has also been considered relative to the potential location of sunlight and reflection on glass barrier surfaces. Many habitats include both glass viewing (for up close experiences) and open view fencing or barrier walls.

The design of the Zoo also allows for a variety of programming. Special events, including weddings and banquets, can be held on the Giraffe Café event lawn. Additional space is available at the Beer Garden and other locations around

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the site. These spaces are in in the center of the site or along the western edge, providing a buffer from the residences at Sterling Meadows.

Night programing is also an opportunity. The existing Zoo has recently tested a Night Zoo program with light shows and music and the proposed design incorporates opportunities for projected video and images within the habitats and on building and rock walls. Night Zoo events provide the opportunity for additional revenue sources for funding operations. Again, the location of these activities is planned on the western half of the site to limit conflicts with the adjoining neighborhood.

Building Architecture

As previously noted, the proposed SPA establishes a process for the review and approval of so-called "Level 1" buildings. These are major building facilities "that reflect on the overall design character and quality of the Zoological complex." As part of Phase 1A/1B of the Project, these buildings include the Entry Complex, the Animal Care Center/Nutrition Center, and the Giraffe Café. Major buildings in future phases will require additional review and approval by the City Council at that time.

Renderings of the Phase 1A/1B Level 1 buildings are provided in **Figures** 10, 11, and 12. While each of the proposed buildings is unique and reflective of its place on the site and the intent and use of the building, a common architecture language is established for the site, with the use of similar colors, materials, and overall building style. This includes the use of corrugated metal, roof overhangs and trellises, and approachable building massing and articulation. The architecture and landscaping design for each is consistent with the design provisions for architecture and landscaping provided in the Zoological Park Special Planning Area. Building designs provide for clearly defined public entrances or access points and detailing is provided in the respective roof designs, building articulations, and material and color pallets. Long blank façades are avoided. Roof planes and forms change in heights and character based upon the respective aspects of the building, including accenting entries and guest spaces from utility areas. The building designs positively contribute to the character and quality of the site by incorporating a common architecture language across the site. Further, the design of the buildings complements the surrounding area by being of high quality.

Zoo Operation (Conditional Use Permit)

The proposed SPA requires the approval of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) before establishment of the Project. As noted in the Elk Grove Municipal Code, a Conditional Use Permit "is for the individual review of uses typically having unusual site-development features or operating characteristics, to ensure compatibility with surrounding areas and uses." A CUP also allows for the imposition of conditions of approval, which are actions, improvements, or other things that the operator is required to do either as part of the initial development or the ongoing operation of the use.

Throughout the process, staff has sought to understand the unique operating characteristics of zoological parks. This has included visits to the existing Zoo in Land Park, to other zoos, including Fresno and Houston, and discussions with Society staff and the design team. Based upon these discussions and the design of the Project, staff believes it is appropriate to issue the CUP, subject to certain conditions. These conditions, which are integrated with the site development conditions in **Attachment 3 Exhibit D**, include the following:

- Limiting the use of amplified sound (except for in the event of an emergency) that is audible at or beyond the boundaries of the Project site, between the hours of 10:00 pm and 8:00 am.
- Conducting regular emergency drills in coordination with the Police Department and Cosumnes Community Services District Fire Department.
- Implement, as applicable, the Mosquito Reducing Best Management Practices as published by the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District.
- In coordination with City Public Works and Police, develop and implement an Opening Day Traffic Control Plan.
- Proving a single point of contact for addressing resident concerns, as suggested by the Planning Commission.

Zoo Art Plan

Section 4.12 of the draft Zoological Park SPA requires the preparation of an Art Plan for the Project. The requirement for the Art Plan follows from adopted <u>City policy</u> requiring artwork at facilities developed with public funds and when designated by the City Council. The draft Art Plan establishes a budget and overall approach for public art for Phases 1A and 1B of the Zoo. Subsequent phases will require updates to the Art Plan to identify the approach for artwork in those phases. The budget for artwork is the same as

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in existing City policy: 2% for the first \$10 million in construction costs and 1% of costs above \$10 million.

The Art Plan was developed through extensive discussion and planning with the City's Arts Commission. The Commission reviewed the final draft of the Art Plan at their meeting on February 22, 2024, and voted 3-0 (Mahon and Guttridge absent) to recommend approval.

Three sites for artwork are identified in the Art Plan, each with a unique intent:

- Main Entrance: A spacious plaza with seating and shade trees creates a place for visitors to gather, meet, wait, and relax before and after their visit. The plaza presents an opportunity for the placement of a monumental and iconic artwork (or artworks), that sets the tone for the visitor's journey and experience and embodies the unique identity of the New Zoo.
- **The Green Corridor**: The artwork(s) in this area should reinforce the visitor's experience of an intuitive journey through the Zoo. Here, there is an opportunity for the artist to create multiple surprising, intimate, and interconnected artworks.
- **The Play Area** (Fun Zone): The art in this area should function as a gateway between the Green Corridor and the Play Area and, like the Play Area itself, it should be colorful, lively, and interactive.

Artwork will be selected through a competitive process. Should the Project be approved by the Council, staff intends to release a Request for Qualifications in fall 2024 to solicit interest from artists and develop a list of qualified candidates. Selected candidates are then invited to develop their ideas and from those the final selections are made. The Arts Commission, along with a technical panel, are involved throughout and the City Council makes the final determination. The current schedule allows for the selected artists and their artwork to be integrated into the overall design work well in advance of construction.

Financing Plan

As noted in the <u>City/Society MOU from May 2022</u>, part of the consideration of the Project includes the development of a Financing Plan. Zoological facilities are major community investments. The <u>2022 Feasibility Study</u> noted that a combination of public and private sector funding would be necessary to construct the Zoo. However, the Feasibility Study did not identify all the specific sources of funds or the definitive costs for the Project. Throughout the development of the Project, the City and Society have commissioned

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multiple rounds of cost estimates and have had extensive discussions on the funding responsibilities. From this, the City has prepared a Financing Plan, which is included as **Attachment 5**.

This Financing Plan addresses the funding needs for Phases 1A and 1B of the Project. The Plan outlines the cost of constructing the on- and off-site improvements, including both soft and hard costs, and identifies a range of funding sources to meet these costs. Financing for the later phases will require the preparation of other financing plans as applicable. This Financing Plan also does not address the annual maintenance obligations for the operation of the New Zoo once constructed; the annual maintenance and operational costs are the sole responsibility of the Zoological Society. As discussed later, an updated Operating Proforma/Business Plan has been prepared to understand the Society's responsibilities in managing the Project operations.

Project Costs

The cost estimates presented in the Financing Plan are based upon the design included in the attached Project plans. They are priced based upon current market conditions, meaning they are based upon similar work and material types for recent construction projects (e.g., paving costs are based upon recent paving work on recent projects). As the Project moves forward into the next round of design work (Design Development and Construction Design) additional estimates will be prepared to ensure alignment between the vision and Project budget.

The costs are divided into two components, on-site and off-site:

- On-site costs include construction of the Zoo itself, including animal habitats and holding areas, the animal care center (veterinary and nutrition facilities), guest facilities and amenities (e.g., gift shops, restaurants, restrooms, plazas), and office and storage/maintenance facilities. This component also includes public art, impact fees, and the north and south parking lot and related drive aisles.
- Off-site costs include public roadways (Lotz Parkway, Kammerer Road, Classical Way, and B Street), water and sewer infrastructure, an off-site detention basin and associated drainage pipelines, and dry utilities (electrical and telecommunications) to the site.

Costs are further divided into four major categories:

• **Construction Costs** are the costs involved in constructing the improvements. This includes both materials and labor and is generally paid to the construction contractor.

- Contingency is an additional budget identified to account for changes in the design or other costs associated with the Project that have been unidentified at the time the estimate is prepared. Contingency is calculated as a percentage of the construction cost estimate. Early in the design process, a high contingency percentage is utilized; as the design is finalized and more details are resolved, the construction costs are refined (and may increase), and the contingency percentage is reduced. At the current Schematic Design stage, a 15 to 30% contingency is utilized, depending upon the project component.
- Soft Costs are non-construction related costs and include design fees, construction management services, fees paid for plan review and inspection or by governmental agencies or impact fees for shared infrastructure, and expenses for furniture, fixtures, and equipment to outfit the Project. In some cases, soft costs are based upon a percentage of the estimated construction costs; in others, they are based upon an estimate of fees or charges expected based on the best available information at the time the estimate is prepared.
- **Escalation** is anticipated increases in the construction costs because of inflation or other increases in labor or material cost anticipated from the time the estimate is prepared until, generally, the mid-point of construction. The escalation factor utilized is based upon the category of the improvement (i.e., on-site, off-site) and the anticipated timeframe before the improvement can be constructed (e.g., 2025-2026 for off-site infrastructure or 2026-2028 for on-site improvements), and historic market trends for increases in construction cost.

Table 3 summarizes the Project costs. Of the on-site component, the total costs for the Zoo exclusive of parking facilities, public art, and impact fees is approximately \$226 million.

Project Financing

A wide range of funding sources have been identified for the Project. These include:

- Development Impact Fee Programs
- City Pay-Go (cash on hand)
- Community Partnerships
- Bond Financing

Table 4 summarizes the funding sources identified to achieve the \$302.3 million Project cost identified in Table 3.

The Financing Plan (**Attachment 5**) describes each of the funding sources in more detail.

Some of the key takeaways of the Financing Plan are:

- The City has been building its discretionary reserves over the past 24 years to use on a major project such as the Zoo. None of these funds are necessary to support ongoing City operations and the use of these funds should not impact any City services.
- The Financing Plan does not utilize the City's Economic Uncertainty Reserve, which is used to address severe economic downturns and represents 25% of adjusted appropriations, equaling \$22.7 million as of the current Fiscal Year.
- The Financing Plan **does not** propose the use of any Measure E funds, and those funds will continue to be used to support the community's highest priorities.
- The Society is directly responsible for securing partner funding in a minimum amount of \$50 million, with an additional \$30 million jointly

secured by the City and Society for energy efficiency and animal care components.

- Bond financing is necessary to complete the financing. Approximately 68% of the annual repayment will come from the City, with the balance, 32% from the Society.
- When specifically looking at the City's share, exclusive of development impact fees, the City is contributing 57% towards the overall costs. This includes the City Pay-Go and 68% of the Bond repayment. This percentage is lower (39%) when excluding funding elements related to the Wilton Rancheria MOU.

Managing Risks

The Financing Plan identifies a number of potential risks to the City and the Project and identifies five management tools and techniques to manage that risk. Potential risks include:

- Utilization of the City's discretionary reserves and other recurring revenues for the Project that could be used on other projects.
- Increasing construction costs that are outside the City's control.
- Increasing bond financing costs mainly due to interest rate changes that are outside the City's control.
- Design and construction challenges or elements that may not be fully recognized in the cost estimates.
- Challenges in securing partner funding.

To manage these risks, the Financing Plan identifies the following (see additional details on each in the Financing Plan):

- 1. Prepare additional cost estimates throughout the Design Development and Construction Design phases.
- 2. Securing the services of a Construction Management firm to assist with refinements to the Project plans and to incorporate means and methods for the construction of the Project into future estimates.
- 3. The City will not issue the bonds and proceed with on-site facility construction unless then-current bond rates are at a level that allows the City and Society to afford the annual payment.

- 4. The City and Society will need to coordinate fundraising activities and market the Project to a wide range of potential partners. The timing of these funds is of paramount importance. To address this:
 - a. The Society has agreed to a schedule for securing their portion of the partner funding, with 25% necessary at time of Project approval (spring 2024) and 100% due prior to on-site construction. Additional interim milestones have also been identified, which allows for tracking of the funding progress relative to progress in completing construction design.
 - b. The Society will work to identify the cash flow requirements of the Partner funds once the actual donations are better known and identified beyond the Project approval date. The Society will seek to identify incremental funding relative to the construction fund needs and any potential short-term borrowing that could be pledged against the outstanding pledge commitments.
- 5. Consideration of development of a Preview Phase that advances a core element of the Project in a way that can showcase the opportunity to potential community partners and that reduces some of the potential exposure to escalation in construction costs.

Financing Summary and Next Steps

City staff believes that the Financing Plan, as presented, is a realistic and viable approach to completing the Project. Should the Council ultimately approve the Project, the following next steps are requested or planned:

- The City and Society will prepare an agreement to memorialize terms and conditions for financing the Project and roles and responsibilities for delivering the Project. See discussion of draft terms for this agreement below.
- The City will work with the Sacramento County Water Agency and Sacramento Area Sewer District on agreements relative to fee obligations and credits and reimbursement for the construction of their facilities as part of the Project.
- As of July 1, 2024, there are sufficient City funds on hand to proceed with Design Development and Construction Design work for the Off-Site Facilities. The City will proceed with developing Capital Improvement Program projects for these elements and move forward with these phases of work. There are also sufficient funds available over the next five years to proceed with the construction of these facilities. The improvements will ultimately be needed for any future development in the area.

- Sufficient City and Society funds are available to advance Design Development and Construction Design for the on-site facilities.
- On-Site Facility construction may occur in phases (the Preview Phase, then the balance of Phases 1A and 1B) based upon securing Community Partner funding.

The obligations of the City and Society, as provided in the Financing Plan, would become a contractual obligation through the approval and execution of a Financing/Cost Sharing Agreement. Staff and the society have negotiated draft terms for this agreement, which are provided in **Attachment** 6. Staff is seeking feedback from the Council on these terms in advance of presenting a final agreement. Should the Council approve the Project, the final agreement would be presented at a future meeting. Major components of the draft terms include:

- The Society is responsible for achieving the \$50 million in fundraising (at minimum in the form of pledges) upon a date-specific schedule, which is provided below. The initial \$12.5 million required by May 8, 2024, has been achieved by the Society and documentation of this has been provided to the City and is included as **Attachment 7**.
 - o By May 8, 2024: \$12,500,000
 - o By January 1, 2024: \$17,500,000
 - o By May 1, 2025: \$27,500,000
 - o By January 1, 2026: \$30,000,000
 - By May 1, 2025: \$40,000,000
 - o By January 1, 2027: \$50,000,000
- If fundraising milestones are not met, City may suspend design work until required fundraising is achieved.
- Donations to the Project may include cash contributions or material donations.
- Cash donations may be associated with naming or sponsorship rights for one or more portions of the Project. The Society may solicit for naming and sponsorship for the Project, subject to approval by the City (this is discussed later in this report).
- The Society is responsible for \$2.5 million or 32% of the total debt service payment annually towards the bond repayment, as provided in the Financing Plan.

• The Society is solely responsible for financing the day-to-day operations and maintenance of the Project.

Operating Proforma/Business Plan

In 2022, the Society prepared a Feasibility Study for the Project, which included an operating proforma. The 2022 MOU between the City and Society provides for an update to the operating proforma to reflect the Project design. The latest analysis is provided in **Attachment 8**, a Business Plan Update. Key components and outcomes of the Operating Proforma/Business Plan are:

- Phase 1A/1B annual attendance is projected at a baseline of 850,000 (a 63% increase over the Land Park site), with opening year at 935,000 and a decreasing baseline by year five.
- Admission pricing will continue to be dynamic, as has been implemented at Land Park, but will increase to an average of \$39 for adult, \$36 for senior, \$30 for children, and \$15 for school groups. Dynamic pricing enables, encourages, and incentivizes advance planning through online ticket purchases. The increased price reflects the value proposition of the New Zoo with increased parking, improved exhibits, amenities, and experiences, and highly programed guest experiences with unique interactions and experiences and longer guest stay times (2.5 hours compared to 1.5 hours for Land Park).
- Membership is anticipated to increase to 24,000 households from 13,500. Pricing for memberships for Elk Grove households would receive a 20% discount compared to the general rate.
- Parking is included in the price of admission.
- No annual operating support from the City of Elk Grove is programmed.
- The five-year projections identify a viable and sustainable financial model with annual net operating income projections that range from 7.6% of total operating revenues in year 1 to 3.4% in year 5.
- Visitor per capita spending will increase by 30% over the 2022 per capita with new and expanded food, dining, and retail venues.
- The pro forma includes payments towards the City bond debt service, as described in the Financing Plan.

Economic Impact Analysis

Also in 2022, the City commissioned an Economic Impact Analysis for the Project. An update to this Analysis (March 2024) has been prepared and is

included as **Attachment 9**. Key conclusions of the updated Economic Impact Analysis are:

- Based on projected annual attendance of more than 935,000 visitors per year in the opening year, and stabilized long-term attendance of 850,000 people per year, the New Zoo could create a total economic impact (the direct impacts of on-site operations and the indirect and induced impacts of off-site visitor spending, local vendor purchases, and employee spending) of \$249 million in the City over the next five years.
- Zoo employment at the new facility is estimated at 140 to 144 people with an annual payroll of \$11 million to \$12 million, which represents a 37% increase over current employment levels. In addition, there could be 75 to 80 third-party employees of food and retail concession operators with an annual payroll of \$3 million.
- Through vendor purchases, employee spending, and visitor spending, the Zoo could support 176 indirect and induced jobs and \$7.9 million in labor income each year at other businesses in Elk Grove, as well as 215 jobs and \$9.1 million in annual payroll in other parts of the metro area. Some of these impacts represent existing economic activity associated with the zoo that would simply shift to a new location, but a portion of the impacts would be new given the projected expansion of the zoo at the new site.
- There could be one-time construction impacts associated with the Zoo relocation that are estimated at \$425 million along with 2,405 total jobs and \$171 million in labor income in Elk Grove and throughout the metro area during the construction period.
- Visitor and employee spending associated with the relocated zoo could generate an estimated \$4.0 million in City sales and transient lodging tax revenues, and \$9.4 million in county and state sales taxes over the next five years. Not all of the revenues to the county and state are net new, given the Zoo's existing operations in Sacramento, but all of the City tax revenue would be new to Elk Grove.

Inclusion in the Capital Improvement Program

The City's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) describes capital improvements planned by the City related to community facilities and enhancements, roadway and alternative transportation improvements, drainage facilities, and other City construction efforts, and sets forth a funding strategy for their implementation. The CIP is a five-year plan that is

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prepared each year and adopted as part of the Fiscal Year budget. State law (Government Code Sections 65103(c) and 65401) requires the City's planning agency (the Planning Commission and City Council) to review and report on proposed CIP projects for conformity with the General Plan. Traditionally the Council would see this as part of the CIP review and adoption in parallel with the annual budget in late May/early June. However, given the nature of the proposed Project, staff recommends that the review occur as part of the Project's overall consideration.

As previously described, the Project is consistent with the General Plan and is eligible for listing in the CIP. The exact configuration of the Project within the CIP, including the number of discrete projects and their project code are still being determined. Therefore, staff and the Planning Commission recommend the totality of the Project being consistent with the General Plan, giving the Public Works Director the flexibility to recommend the specific configuration of the Project in the CIP to the City Council at a later date.

Facility Naming

In August 2008, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2008-204, establishing a naming policy for City Facilities. While the naming policy provides for the naming of facilities and project elements based upon monetary contributions, the policy also requires that naming of City facilities occur by a majority vote of the City Council. Staff recommends that the Council allow for an alternative process where naming is proposed by the Society and consented to by the City (via the City Manager), except for any naming for the Zoo itself, which would require City Council approval. The naming policy allows for compelling reasons to deviate from the policy guidelines. Such compelling reasons exist here to approve the alternative naming process noted above. In the case of the New Zoo there are opportunities for naming of various exhibits, features, and elements based upon partner funding opportunities, among other considerations. Staff will work with the Society to refine this process as part of the future operating agreement. City Council action at this time will provide the Society the necessary flexibility to work with potential partners on naming opportunities consistent with the proposed Financing Plan and in alignment with the level of their participation.

Project Next Steps

Should the City Council ultimately approve the Project, the following next steps would occur:

- A Financing/Cost Sharing Agreement between the City and Society would be brought back for approval consistent with the term sheet provided in Attachment 6.
- Master services agreements would be prepared and executed with the design teams and the City would take over management of the consultant activities for all design services. Task orders for the next round of design services would then be executed and construction design work would commence. The contracts would be brought back for Council consideration at a future Council Meeting.
- Upon adoption of pending State legislation (<u>Senate Bill 739</u>) the City would release a Request for Proposals for a Construction Manager At Risk (CMAR) firm to serve as the overall construction manager and general contractor for the Project.
- An agreement between the City and the Society would be prepared and brought back to the City Council for consideration, addressing long-term operation of the Project by the Society, including responsibilities for maintenance of the improvements, management of the collection, and other topics.

As the design contracts are finalized and the community partnership funding becomes available, staff will be able to prepare a more concrete project schedule. Staff is working with the design team, and in the future will work with the CMAR firm, to identify opportunities for streamlining and accelerated delivery to the extent that it does not impact the Project costs or the integrity of the Project.

Public Engagement

The City has undertaken extensive public outreach activities as part of the development of the Project. Over 30 zoo related community events, presentations, and informational booths have been held over the past two years. Some of these activities have included:

- Community surveys in 2022.
- Outreach events at the 2022 4th of July event at Elk Grove Park and the 2022 Multicultural Festival at District 56.
- A neighborhood BBQ in the Sterling Meadows neighborhood (directly east of the site) in July 2022.

- Community open houses and presentations in August 2022 and November 2023.
- Presentations at various community groups, including but not limited to, Rotary Club meetings, Chamber of Commerce, EGUSD staff meetings, Al Misbaah, Civic Summer program, and Del Webb/Glenbrooke.
- A public meeting to accept comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Report in February 2024.
- The Planning Commission public hearing in April 2024.
- Community webinar on April 17, 2024. The webinar focused on the financing plan. A total of 239 individuals registered for the event with 73 people participating. A video recording of the event is available on the City's website.

The City has also received extensive written comments on the Project, both in support of and opposed to the Project. To date, more than 300 comments have been received, with approximately 91% indicating support for the Project. These comments, along with additional analysis, are provided in **Attachment 10**.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

The California Environmental Quality Act (Section 21000, et. seq. of the California Public Resources Code, hereafter CEQA) requires analysis of agency approvals of discretionary "projects." A "project," under CEQA, is defined as "the whole of an action, which has a potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment." The proposed project is a project under CEQA. Approval of the proposed New Zoo at Elk Grove Project requires an Environmental Impact Report (EIR).

The City prepared a Notice of Preparation (NOP) and circulated it to public agencies and interested parties (including the general public) on November 18, 2022. The NOP provided an introduction to the Project. Comments on the scope of the EIR were requested by January 13, 2023, consistent with the requirements of the State CEQA Guidelines. Comments received on the NOP are included in the Draft EIR (Appendix B of the Draft EIR) and responses are provided in Chapter 1 of the Draft EIR.

The Draft EIR has been prepared to meet the requirements of a project EIR as defined by Section 15161 of the State CEQA Guidelines. A project EIR focuses on the changes in the physical environment that would result from the implementation of a project, including its planning, construction, and operation. The State's intention is that a lead agency preparing a project EIR would not be required to provide further environmental analysis for additional regulatory approvals following approval of the project, absent conditions requiring a subsequent EIR, a supplement to the EIR, or an addendum. As such, the EIR has been prepared to address the potential environmental impact of all phases of the Project.

The Draft EIR identified a range of potential impacts resulting from approval of the Project. Some of these impacts are analyzed in comparison to existing Zoological Park in Land Park in Sacramento. The impact areas come from the State's CEQA guidelines (the CEQA Checklist).

The EIR has identified the following environmental issue areas as having potentially significant environmental impacts from implementation of the Project:

- Aesthetics
- Air Quality
- Biological Resources
- Cultural and Tribal Resources
- Energy
- Greenhouse Gas Emissions
- · Geology and Soils

- Hazards and Hazardous Materials
- Hydrology and Water Quality
- Land Use
- Noise
- Public Services
- Transportation
- Utilities and Service Systems

Conclusions to the potential impacts are classified as either less than significant, less than significant after incorporation of mitigation measures, or significant and unavoidable. Significant and unavoidable impacts do not limit the City's ability to approve a project. Rather, given CEQA's role in providing disclosure of potential impacts, the City may approve a project with significant impacts that cannot be mitigated to a less than significant level. CEQA Guidelines Section 15093 states that "CEQA requires the [City] to balance, as applicable, the economic, legal, social, technological, or other benefits, including region-wide or statewide environmental benefits, of a proposed project against its unavoidable environmental risks when determining whether to approve the project. If the specific economic, legal, social, technological, or other benefits, including region-wide or statewide environmental benefits, of a proposed project outweigh the unavoidable

adverse environmental effects, the adverse environmental effects may be considered 'acceptable.' When the [City] approves a project which will result in the occurrence of significant effects which are identified in the final EIR but are not avoided or substantially lessened, the [City] shall state in writing the specific reasons to support its action based on the final EIR and/or other information in the record. The statement of overriding considerations shall be supported by substantial evidence in the record." A statement of overriding considerations is necessary to approve the Project as two impacts, Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Transportation, remain significant and unavoidable after application of all feasible mitigation measures.

On January 5, 2024, the City released the Draft EIR. The Draft EIR was made available for public review and comment on the City's website, at City Hall, and at the Elk Grove library for a period of 45 days. Public comments on the Draft EIR were due to the City on February 20, 2024. Comments were received from five agencies and 35 individuals on the content of the Draft EIR. Responses to these comments have been prepared by staff and are included in the Final EIR.

The Final EIR also includes an erratum of changes to the Draft EIR as a result of the public comments on the Project, the comments to the Draft EIR, and other revisions to the Project as identified by the City and Society. The Final EIR indicates that the modifications to the Project are minor in nature and do not cause any change in significant impacts that were analyzed in the Draft EIR.

ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS:

The City Council may decide not to approve the Project, in which case the Zoo would not be developed in Elk Grove. Staff does not recommend this as approval of the Zoo is in alignment with City goals and priorities and is within the financial capacity of the City. Further, given the current status of the Zoo in Land Park relative to its accreditation, failure to secure a new, larger site for the Zoo consistent with the modern design and accreditation requirements would most likely result in the ultimate closure of the Zoo and a loss of this amenity for the region. Therefore, staff recommends approval of the Project as proposed.

FISCAL IMPACT:

As mentioned, a Financing Plan has been prepared for the Project, which details the strategy for construction of Phases 1A and 1B of the Zoo. The Financing Plan relies upon various funding sources, including both City funds

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and community partnerships. Again, the City's share of the Project is 57% of the overall costs; which decreases to 39% when funds from the Wilton Rancheria agreement are excluded.

The Financing Plan is reliant on \$93 million in City funds, primarily \$63 million from three General Fund Reserve accounts: the Capital Reserve Fund, the Economic Development Fund, and the General Fund Opportunity Reserve. These discretionary reserves are used for special projects, acquisitions, or other needs the City Council identifies. These funds are separate from the Economic Uncertainty Reserve, or "rainy day fund", which assists with navigating future economic uncertainty, cash flow needs, and emergency and disaster recovery (the current balance is \$22.7 million). The contribution from these three funds would utilize the entire fund balance as of June 30. 2023. These funds would likely be replenished to some extent through additional transfers to reserves during the period when the City is spending these balances down and before it commits to a debt service payment. No alternative projects have been identified for these funds. The City's ability to support other large, transformational projects would likely be constrained in the near-term since the entire balance of these discretionary reserves would be used.

The Financing Plan envisions the need to procure approximately \$114.5 million in bond financing. At today's tax-exempt rates (around 4.25%), and assuming the City's current "AA" credit rating, the associated annual debt service would be approximately \$7.8 million. The Society would contribute \$2.5 million, with the City contributing the remaining \$5.3 million. The City would utilize a combination of Wilton Rancheria payments and funds that have been "freed up" by paying off other debt obligations to make its debt service payments. The debt issuance will be brought to the City Council for approval at a future meeting.

Additionally, it is important to restate that the Financing Plan **does not** require or propose the use of any Measure E funds, and those funds will continue to be used to support the community's highest priorities. It also **does not** take away funding from any existing or planned programs or services and does not require reductions to any existing or planned programs.

Finally, as noted, the Financing Plan includes safeguards for the City, including:

• Clear requirements for the securing of community partnership funding and restricting Project construction until those funds are secured.

- Limiting the issuance of the proposed bond financing unless thencurrent bond rates are at a level that allows the City to afford the annual payment.
- Requiring the Society to participate in the bond repayment plan.

The provisions of the Financing Plan and the responsibilities and obligations of the City and the Society would be memorialized in a future Cost Sharing Agreement, the draft terms of which are provided in Attachment 6.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ELK GROVE CERTIFYING THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT FOR THE NEW ZOO AT ELK GROVE PROJECT, ADOPTING FINDINGS OF FACT AND A STATEMENT OF OVERRIDING CONSIDERATIONS AND A MITIGATION MONITORING AND REPORTING PROGRAM

WHEREAS, on September 23, 2021, the City of Elk Grove (City) and Sacramento Zoological Society (the Society) entered into an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement (ENA) to explore development of a zoological park in Elk Grove; and

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2022, the City Council received a Feasibility Study describing the potential construction and operating characteristics for a potential New Zoo in Elk Grove (the Project); and

WHEREAS, the City Council directed staff to prepare a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Society regarding master planning and environmental review for a Zoo in Elk Grove; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2022, the City Council and the Society entered into that MOU, which provided a process for the development of schematic design plans, preparation of an Environmental Impact Report for the Project, and development of other information and materials, including a Finance Plan; and

WHEREAS, on April 8, 2022, the City acquired an approximately 103-acre property at the northwest corner of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway, more particularly described as APNs 132-0320-001, 002, & 010, which, pursuant to the terms of the MOU, has been identified as the "Candidate Site" for the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the MOU, the City retained the services of a qualified civil engineering firm to prepare conceptual and schematic design for off-site infrastructure services, and the Society retained the services of a qualified zoological park design firm (supplemented by other technical expert design firms), and that together these firms make up the Design Team for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City and the Society have worked closely in partnership to develop a comprehensive, multiphase design plan for the proposed Project, including key components of an entry complex, animal habitats, guest facilities and amenities including dining and retail spaces, animal care center and holding areas, facility storage and warehousing, guest and employee parking facilities, and off-site infrastructure necessary to serve the Project; and

WHEREAS, during the course of the conceptual and schematic design, potential future acquisition of a Cosumnes Community Services District property at APN 132-2390-006 was identified as an opportunity for employee parking and, along with the Candidate Site, makes up the Project Site; and

WHEREAS, the City determined that the Project shall, pursuant to the terms of the City's Municipal Code, be treated as any other development application and is subject to entitlement requirements and other discretionary procedures provided in the Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, City staff determined that the existing zoning and other development regulations present in the City's Municipal Code were insufficient to address the unique needs of the Project and worked with the Society and the Design Team to prepare a new Special Planning Area zoning document that would guide the entitlement, permitting, development standards, and development process for the Project; and

WHEREAS, public outreach and engagement is of critical importance to the City and, as such, the City prepare and executed an extensive public engagement plan, which included more than 30 workshops, popup events, and other meetings at various locations and times throughout the design process, including a dedicated event with the adjoining neighborhood in the summer of 2022, as well as community open houses in August 2022 and November 2023 and presentation at numerous community groups; and

WHEREAS, the City determined that the Project is subject to the California Environmental Quality Act; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing on April 4, 2024, as required by law, to consider all of the information presented by staff, the Society, and the Design Team, as well as public testimony presented in writing and at the meeting and voted 5-0 to recommend approval of the Project to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing on May 8, 2024, as required by law, to consider all of the information presented by staff, the Society, and the Design Team, as well as public testimony presented in writing and at the meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Elk Grove as follows:

1. Certification of the EIR

- A. The City Council hereby certifies that the Draft and Final EIR (together the EIR, presented as Exhibits A and B respectively, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference) have been completed in compliance with the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act.
- B. The City Council hereby certifies that the EIR was presented to the City Council and that the City Council reviewed and considered the information contained in the EIR prior to taking action on the Project.
- C. The City Council hereby certifies that the EIR reflects the independent judgment and analysis of the City Council.

2. Findings on Impacts

The City Council finds that the EIR identifies potentially significant impacts that cannot be mitigated to a less than significant level and are thus considered significant and unavoidable. The City Council makes the findings with respect to these significant and unavoidable impacts as set forth in Exhibit C, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

3. Findings on Alternatives

The City Council finds that the alternatives analyzed in the EIR are rejected because the alternatives would not achieve the project objectives. The City Council makes the finding as set forth in Exhibit C, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

4. Statement of Overriding Considerations

The City Council finds that there are no feasible mitigation measures or project alternatives that would mitigate or substantially lessen the impacts from the Project. Despite the occurrence of these significant effects, however, the City Council chooses to approve the Project because, in its view, the environmental, social, and other benefits of the project will render the significant effects acceptable as described in Statement of Overriding Considerations as set forth in Exhibit C, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

5. Adoption of the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program

A. The City Council hereby finds that the proposed mitigation measures described in the EIR and Findings are feasible, and therefore will become binding upon the City and on future actions. The Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program is included as Exhibit D, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

B. The City Council hereby adopts the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program, as set forth in Exhibit D, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2022, the City Council received a Feasibility Study describing the potential construction and operating characteristics for a potential New Zoo in Elk Grove (the Project); and

WHEREAS, the City Council directed staff to prepare a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Society regarding master planning and environmental review for a Zoo in Elk Grove; AND

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2022, the City Council and the Society entered into that MOU, which provided a process for the development of schematic design plans, preparation of an Environmental Impact Report for the Project, and development of other information and materials, including a Finance Plan; and

The City prepared a Notice of Preparation (NOP) and circulated it to public agencies and interested parties (including the general public) on November 18, 2022. The NOP provided an introduction to the Project. Comments on the scope of the EIR were requested by January 13, 2023, consistent with the requirements of the State CEQA

Guidelines. Comments received on the NOP are included in the Draft EIR (Appendix B of the Draft EIR) and responses are provided in Chapter 1 of the Draft EIR.

The Draft EIR has been prepared to meet the requirements of a project EIR as defined by Section 15161 of the State CEQA Guidelines. A project EIR focuses on the changes in the physical environment that would result from the implementation of a project, including its planning, construction, and operation. The State's intention is that a lead agency preparing a project EIR would not be required to provide further environmental analysis for additional regulatory approvals following approval of the project, absent conditions requiring a subsequent EIR, a supplement to the EIR, or an addendum. As such, the EIR has been prepared to address the potential environmental impact of all phases of the Project.

If the specific economic, legal, social, technological, or other benefits, including region-wide or statewide environmental benefits, of a proposed project outweigh the unavoidable adverse environmental effects, the adverse environmental effects may be considered 'acceptable.' When the [City] approves a project which will result in the occurrence of significant effects which are identified in the final EIR but are not avoided or substantially lessened, the [City] shall state in writing the specific reasons to support its action based on the final EIR and/or other information in the record. The statement of overriding considerations shall be supported by substantial evidence in the record." A statement of overriding considerations is necessary to approve the General Plan Update as two impacts, Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Transportation, remain significant and unavoidable after application of all feasible mitigation measures.

On January 5, 2024, the City released the Draft EIR. The Draft EIR was made available for public review and comment on the City's website, at City Hall, and at the Elk Grove library for a period of 45 days. Public comments on the Draft EIR were due to the City on February 20, 2024. Comments were received from five agencies and 35 individuals on the content of the Draft EIR. Responses to these comments have been prepared by staff and are included in the Final EIR.

The Final EIR also includes an erratum of changes to the Draft EIR as a result of the public comments on the Project, the comments to the Draft EIR, and other revisions to the Project as identified by the City. In lieu of publication of the full text of the ordinance within fifteen (15) days after its passage, a summary of the ordinance may be published at least five (5) days prior to and fifteen (15) days after adoption by the City Council and a certified copy shall be posted in the office of the City Clerk, pursuant to GC 36933(c)(1).

The proposed Zoological Park implements the General Plan Vision and the noted goal and policies as it provides for a family-oriented activity in a park-like environment and expands the range of community services and amenities. It also furthers objectives the City has to be a regional destination as noted in Goal RC-1.

<u>Finding #2:</u> The establishment, maintenance, or operation of the use applied for will not, under the circumstances of the particular case (location, size, design, and operating characteristics), be detrimental to the health, safety, peace, morals, comfort, or general welfare of persons residing or working in the neighborhood of such use, or the general welfare of the City.

Evidence: The proposed location is ideal for the Project as it is along the major roadway of Kammerer Road, with access today to State Route 99 and, in the future, Interstate 5. This level of access is ideal for both local and regional users to access the site. Roadways and parking facilities are designed for easy access from Kammerer Road, with logical movements and ample signage to direct visitors to the site. The Project scale is designed to provide for the long-term operation of the Project, with ample space to grow the facility in the future. The design includes extensive containment systems and security features, including exterior walls and fences, animal holding areas, and habitat containment, consistent with the requirements of the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) for wild animal holding and the standards of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums. Additional security features include security cameras, lighting, and public address systems. The operator is required to maintain USDA permits and accreditation of the facility for the life of the operation, and to coordinate with City Police and Cosumnes Community Services District Fire Department on training for emergency events. Light and noise from the Project has been analyzed and given the nature of the Project, and as conditioned, these components will not be an impact to nearby uses, as described in the Environmental Impact Report. As such, the proposed use will not be detrimental to the health, safety, peace, morals, comfort, and general welfare of the public and those in the immediate area.

Tentative Subdivision Map

<u>Finding</u>: None of the findings (a) through (g) below in Section 66474 of the California Government Code that require a City to deny approval of a tentative map apply to this project.

- a. That the proposed map is not consistent with applicable general and specific plans as specified in Section 65451.
- b. That the design or improvement of the proposed subdivision is not consistent with applicable general and specific plans.
- c. That the site is not physically suitable for the type of development.
- d. That the site is not physically suitable for the proposed density of development.
- e. That the design of the subdivision or the proposed improvements is likely to cause substantial environmental damage or substantially and avoidably injure fish or wildlife or their habitat.
- f. That the design of the subdivision or type of improvements is likely to cause serious public health problems.
- g. That the design of the subdivision or type of improvements will conflict with easements acquired by the public at large, for access through or use of, property within the proposed subdivision.

Evidence:

- a. The proposed map is consistent with the General Plan as it provides for the extension of the public street system consistent with the Circulation Plan and the Roadway Sizing Diagram. Right-of-way set-asides are provided along roadways, lots are established for drainage facilities, and
- b. The design of the proposed subdivision is consistent with the provisions of the General Plan and the Zoological Park Special Planning Area relative to street configurations and roadway cross sections, along with the proposed utility corridors and drainage infrastructure.
- c. The Project site is physically suitable to the type of development proposed. There are no major grading issues, access limitations, or other factors that would restrict the proposed land division.
- d. The Project site is physically suitable for the proposed density of development, as it is of sufficient size for the proposed activity and has access to major transportation corridors to facilitate the movement of people and goods to and from the site.
- e. The design of the proposed Project will not cause substantial environmental damage or impact fish or wildlife or their habitat as evidenced in the Project Environmental Impact Report.
- f. The design of the Project subdivision is not likely to impact public health and safety. There is adequate access to and from the site, with multiple points of emergency ingress and egress.
- g. The proposed Project will not conflict with an easement for public access. Existing access rights for widening of Kammerer Road along the Project frontage were previously acquired by the City. The Project includes set aside of right-of-way for the extension of Classical Way across the site and extension of B Street from the Souza Dairy subdivision project from the north to Kammerer Road. Existing easements are proposed for abandonment and are no longer necessary, as they will be replaced with new easements for utilities parallel to the public street system or as otherwise coordinated with the utility providers, as noted in the Project conditions of approval.

Subdivision Design Review

<u>Finding #1</u>: The proposed Project is consistent with the objectives of the General Plan, complies with applicable zoning regulations, Specific Plan provisions, Special Planning Area provisions, and Citywide Design Guidelines adopted by the City.

Evidence #1: The proposed Zoological Park is consistent with the General Plan. The Vision Statement provides that Elk Grove is "great place to make a home, a great place to work, and a great place to play" and describes the community as being "family-oriented" and plentiful in parks. General Plan Goal RC-1 notes that "Elk Grove aims to become a center within the larger region, providing opportunities for employment, recreation, education, retail, industry, and residential development. This objective aligns with regional goals for economic development, sustainability and resiliency, and quality of life." Accompanying policy RC-1-3 provides that Elk Grove should invest in public infrastructure, including developing "great public spaces including urban plazas and parks, and adequate community services." Policy CIF-5-1 provides that "community facilities should be planned and designed to provide

services and programs available for residents." The proposed Zoological Park implements the General Plan Vision and the noted goal and policies as it provides for a family-oriented activity in a park-like environment and expands the range of community services and amenities. It also furthers objectives the City has to be a regional destination as noted in Goal RC-1

The design of the proposed Project is consistent with the development standards provided for in the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, including setbacks, building height, parking requirements, and other standards. Roadways are designed consistent with the provisions of the Special Planning Area and the City Improvement Standards.

<u>Finding #2:</u> The proposed architecture, site design, and landscape are suitable for the purposes of the building and the site and will enhance the character of the neighborhood and community.

<u>Evidence #2</u>: The proposed subdivision design is suitable for the development of the site. Individual lots are created for the Zoological Park itself, along with each of the parking lots. Additional lots are created for drainage facilities and remainder areas east of B Drive. Adequate public right-of-way is set aside for Lotz Parkway, Classical Drive, and B Drive, and pedestrian easements and utility easements are provided along all roadways.

<u>Finding #3:</u> The architecture, including the character, scale and quality of the design, relationship with the site and other buildings, building materials, colors, screening of exterior appurtenances, exterior lighting and signing and similar elements establishes a clear design concept and is compatible with the character of buildings on adjoining and nearby properties.

Evidence #3: While this condition is not applicable to tentative subdivision maps, the architecture and site design of the Project is consistent with the design provisions for architecture and landscaping provided in the Zoological Park Special Planning Area. Building designs provide for clearly defined public entrances or access points and detailing is provided in the respective roof designs, building articulations, and material and color pallets. Long blank façades are avoided. Roof planes and forms change in heights and character based upon the respective aspects of the building, including accenting entries and guest spaces from utility areas. The building designs positively contribute to the character and quality of the site by incorporating a common architecture language across the site. Further, the design of the buildings complements the surrounding area by being of high quality. While each of the proposed buildings are unique and reflective of its place on the site and the intent and use of the building, a common architecture language is established for the site, with the use of similar colors, materials, and overall building style. This includes the use of corrugated metal, roof overhangs and trellises, and approachable building massing and articulation.

<u>Finding #4:</u> The proposed Project will not create conflicts with vehicular, bicycle, or pedestrian modes of transportation.

<u>Evidence #4</u>: The design of the Project site separates arriving vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic into approach areas. Bicycle parking is located sufficiently near the entrances to the Zoo to be convenient and safe, but far enough away that bicycle

activities do not impede pedestrian traffic into the facility. Bicycle parking is provided on both the east and west approaches to help accommodate this. Within the parking area, dedicated pedestrian paths are provided. Within the Zoo, pedestrian/guest spaces are separated from utility and service paths, reducing conflict between guest and operations staff and services.

District Development Plan

<u>Finding #1:</u> The proposed project is consistent with the objectives of the General Plan, complies with applicable zoning regulations, special planning area provisions, Citywide and/or other applicable design guidelines, and improvement standards adopted by the City.

Evidence #1: The proposed Zoological Park is consistent with the General Plan. The Vision Statement provides that Elk Grove is "great place to make a home, a great place to work, and a great place to play" and describes the community as being "family-oriented" and plentiful in parks. General Plan Goal RC-1 notes that "Elk Grove" aims to become a center within the larger region, providing opportunities for employment, recreation, education, retail, industry, and residential development. This objective aligns with regional goals for economic development, sustainability and resiliency, and quality of life." Accompanying policy RC-1-3 provides that Elk Grove should invest in public infrastructure, including developing "great public spaces including urban plazas and parks, and adequate community services." Policy CIF-5-1 provides that "community facilities should be planned and designed to provide services and programs available for residents." The proposed Zoological Park implements the General Plan Vision and the noted goal and policies as it provides for a family-oriented activity in a park-like environment and expands the range of community services and amenities. It also furthers objectives the City has to be a regional destination as noted in Goal RC-1.

The design of the proposed Project is consistent with the development standards provided for in the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, including setbacks, building height, parking requirements, and other standards. Roadways are designed consistent with the provisions of the Special Planning Area and the City Improvement Standards. The design includes an easy, logical arrival experience with a dedicated drop-off area. Parking areas are designed with pedestrian corridors for safe movements in and around vehicles (General Design Principals, SPA section 4.2). Individual habitat zones are built off the main street, or Green Corridor (Site Design, SPA section 4.3). Access and wayfinding is consistent with the provisions provided in section 4.4 of the SPA.

<u>Finding #2:</u> The proposed site design, landscaping, and other aspects of the project will positively contribute to the character and quality of the site and project and the surrounding neighborhood and community.

<u>Evidence #2:</u> As described in the Project plans, the Project design will positively contribute to the surrounding neighborhood. A solid wall is provided along the Lotz Parkway frontage, with landscaping and trail improvements, screening the site from adjoining development to the east. The layout of the site is built off of the surrounding context, including Classical Way, Lotz Parkway, and B Street.

<u>Finding #3:</u> The proposed project site design will not create conflicts with vehicular, bicycle, or pedestrian transportation modes of circulation.

<u>Evidence #3:</u> The design of the Project site separates arriving vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic into approach areas. Bicycle parking is located sufficiently near the entrances to the Zoo to be convenient and safe, but far enough away that bicycle activities do not impede pedestrian traffic into the facility. Bicycle parking is provided on both the east and west approaches to help accommodate this. Within the parking area, dedicated pedestrian paths are provided. Within the Zoo, pedestrian/guest spaces are separated from utility and service paths, reducing conflict between guest and operations staff and services.

Level 1 Design Review

<u>Finding #1:</u> The proposed architecture, landscaping, and other features of the building will positively contribute to the character and quality of the site and project and the surrounding neighborhood and community.

<u>Evidence #1:</u> The architecture and landscaping design for the Level 1 Buildings, including the Entry Complex, Giraffe Lodge, and Gelada Café/Animal Care Center are consistent with the design provisions for architecture and landscaping provided in the Zoological Park Special Planning Area. Building designs provide for clearly defined public entrances or access points and detailing is provided in the respective roof designs, building articulations, and material and color pallets. Long blank façades are avoided. Roof planes and forms change in heights and character based upon the respective aspects of the building, including accenting entries and guest spaces from utility areas. The building designs positively contribute to the character and quality of the site by incorporating a common architecture language across the site. Further, the design of the buildings complements the surrounding area by being of high quality.

<u>Finding #2:</u> The architecture, including the character, scale and quality of the design, relationship with the site and other buildings, building materials, colors, screening of exterior appurtenances, exterior lighting and signing and similar elements establishes a clear design concept and is compatible with the character of buildings elsewhere on the site.

<u>Evidence #2:</u> While each of the proposed buildings are unique and reflective of its place on the site and the intent and use of the building, a common architecture language is established for the site, with the use of similar colors, materials, and overall building style. This includes the use of corrugated metal, roof overhangs and trellises, and approachable building massing and articulation.

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council hereby approves the Art Plan for the Project as described in Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference and based upon the following finding;

Art Plan

<u>Finding:</u> The proposed art plan implements the requirements of the Zoological Park Special Planning Area and is consistent with the objectives of the City's Percent for the Arts Program.

<u>Evidence:</u> The proposed Art Plan provides a strategy for integrating public art into the Project, describing the process to solicit, select, and install the artwork. The Art Plan utilizes the same approach to setting the overall art budget as provided in the City's Percent for the Arts Program.

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council finds that the proposed Project is consistent with the City's General Plan based upon the analysis presented in the May 8, 2024 staff report and based upon the prior General Plan consistency findings contained in this resolution and may be listed in the City's Capital Improvement Program in such form as recommended to the City Council by the Public Works Director.




Exhibit B Project Description

The proposed Project, **The New Zoo at Elk Grove**, involves the construction of a new zoological park and associated facilities and activities on an approximately 103-acre site at the northwest corner of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway.

The zoological park would include various facilities and buildings to be developed in phases. The main facility would be on approximately 65 acres and would be designed to support an average annual attendance of between 1.1 and 1.6 million visitors. The facility would be organized into four primary zones: Green Corridor, Africa, California, and Australasia. The Green Corridor would be the main pedestrian pathway through the New Zoo.

Conditional Use Permit

Pursuant to the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, the Project includes a Conditional Use Permit for the operation of a zoological park. Components and features include, but are not limited to, the keeping of animals and insects, veterinary care, educational activities, food and beverage service (inclusive of alcohol service, including limited onsite brewing of beer), retail sales, administrative offices, caretaker's quarters, greenhouses/gardens/nurseries, and warehousing and storage of goods and materials for on-site usage. This also includes overnight accommodations (including hotel/motel and patron/guest camping) and special events and programs where the facilities are either provided as a special ticketed event or are available for rent.

Tentative Parcel Map

The Project includes the approval of a Tentative Parcel map in substantially the form provided in the Project plans. The Tentative Parcel Map includes seven (7) lots and the set aside of public right-of-way for public streets and other utilities, as well as the dedication of easements for public utilities.

District Development Plan

Pursuant to the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, the Project includes a District Development Plan, as described in the Project Plans and Exhibits. Major components of the District Development Plan include, but are not limited to:

- Parking facilities
- Main Entry Complex
- Green corridor
- Restaurants and food pavilions, including but not limited to the Giraffe Café, and Gelada Café, and the Beer Garden
- Animal Care Center
- Play areas
- Overnight accommodations
- Education services
- Administration and operations facilities
- Warehouse and storage facilities
- Life Support Systems

 Animal habitats and off-exhibit care areas, including Africa, California, and Australasia

The District Development Plan is organized into four phases. Aside from the core components of Phase 1 (e.g., Main Entry Complex, Green Corridor, Animal Care Center), the order of phasing may be adjusted or otherwise occur in any order.

- Phase 1 of the Project would involve construction of the Green Corridor and Africa.
 However, specific animal habitats within these zones may themselves be phased
 depending on project funding. Phase 1A would include the base Zoo footprint and
 Phase 1B would include additional zoological features as shown in the Project
 Plans. Phase 1C would include the hippopotamus and additional savannas in the
 northwest corner of the site.
- Phase 2 of the Project would include the California zone with exhibits at the southeast portion of the site. The California zone would include restrooms, a rehab and rescue facility, as well as a building for changing exhibits and an education building. Additional overnight guest accommodations may also be included, with views into the animal habitats and holding areas.
- Phase 3 would consist of construction of a permeant administration office building, replacing the modular buildings constructed in Phase 1. The Administration building would be located between the California zone and the entry complex. The building(s) would be no more than three stories tall.
- Phase 4, the Australasia zone, would be located north of the Animal Care building near the northeast corner of the site. Additional overnight guest accommodations may also be included, with views into the animal habitats and holding areas.

The District Development Plan also includes the identification of parking facilities (both guest and employee), pedestrian spaces, utilities, and strategies for landscaping, lighting, shade structures, and other physical attributes as depicted in the Project Plans.

Level 1 Design Review

The Project includes Level 1 Design Review, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, for the following major buildings and facilities:

- Entry Complex
- Giraffe Café/Lodge
- Animal Care Center/Nutrition Center/Gelada Café

The design of the buildings is as provided in the Project plans.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ELK GROVE PROVIDING A COMPELLING REASON TO DEVIATE FROM THE CURRENT GUIDELINES OF THE CITY'S NAMING POLICY AND CREATE AN ALTERNATIVE PROCESS FOR NAMING NEW ZOO BUILDINGS

WHEREAS, on September 23, 2021, the City of Elk Grove (City) and Sacramento Zoological Society (the Society) entered into an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement (ENA) to explore development of a zoological park in Elk Grove; and

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2022, the City Council received a Feasibility Study describing the potential construction and operating characteristics for a potential New Zoo in Elk Grove (the Project); and

WHEREAS, the City Council directed staff to prepare a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Society regarding master planning and environmental review for a Zoo in Elk Grove; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2022, the City Council and the Society entered into that MOU, which provided a process for the development of schematic design plans, preparation of an Environmental Impact Report for the Project, and development of other information and materials, including a Finance Plan; and

WHEREAS, on April 8, 2022, the City acquired an approximately 103-acre property at the northwest corner of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway, more particularly described as APNs 132-0320-001, 002, & 010, which, pursuant to the terms of the MOU, has been identified as the "Candidate Site" for the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the MOU, the City retained the services of a qualified civil engineering firm to prepare conceptual and schematic design for off-site infrastructure services, and the Society retained the services of a qualified zoological park design firm (supplemented by other technical expert design firms), and that together these firms make up the Design Team for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City and the Society have worked closely in partnership to develop a comprehensive, multiphase design plan for the proposed Project, including key components of an entry complex, animal habitats, guest facilities and amenities including dining and retail spaces, animal care center and holding areas, facility storage and warehousing, guest and employee parking facilities, and off-site infrastructure necessary to serve the Project; and

WHEREAS, during the course of the conceptual and schematic design, potential future acquisition of a Cosumnes Community Services District property at APN 132-2390-006 was identified as an opportunity for employee parking and, along with the Candidate Site, makes up the Project Site; and

WHEREAS, the City determined that the Project shall, pursuant to the terms of the City's Municipal Code, be treated as any other development application and is subject to entitlement requirements and other discretionary procedures provided in the Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, City staff determined that the existing zoning and other development regulations present in the City's Municipal Code were insufficient to address the unique needs of the Project and worked with the Society and the Design Team to prepare a new Special Planning Area zoning document that would guide the entitlement, permitting, development standards, and development process for the Project; and

WHEREAS, public outreach and engagement is of critical importance to the City and, as such, the City prepare and executed an extensive public engagement plan, which included more than 30 workshops, popup events, and other meetings at various locations and times throughout the design process, including a dedicated event with the adjoining neighborhood in the summer of 2022, as well as community open houses in August 2022 and November 2023 and presentation at numerous community groups; and

WHEREAS, the City determined that the Project is subject to the California Environmental Quality Act; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing on April 4, 2024, as required by law, to consider all of the information presented by staff, the Society, and the Design Team, as well as public testimony presented in writing and at the meeting and voted 5-0 to recommend approval of the Project to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing on May 8, 2024, as required by law, to consider all of the information presented by staff, the Society, and the Design Team, as well as public testimony presented in writing and at the meeting;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Elk Grove hereby finds no further CEQA review is required based upon the following finding:

The City prepared a Notice of Preparation (NOP) and circulated it to public agencies and interested parties (including the general public) on November 18, 2022. The NOP provided an introduction to the Project. Comments on the scope of the EIR were requested by January 13, 2023, consistent with the requirements of the State CEQA Guidelines. Comments received on the NOP are included in the Draft EIR (Appendix B of the Draft EIR) and responses are provided in Chapter 1 of the Draft EIR.

The Draft EIR has been prepared to meet the requirements of a project EIR as defined by Section 15161 of the State CEQA Guidelines. A project EIR focuses on the changes in the physical environment that would result from the implementation of a project, including its planning, construction, and operation. The State's intention is that a lead agency preparing a project EIR would not be required to provide further

environmental analysis for additional regulatory approvals following approval of the project, absent conditions requiring a subsequent EIR, a supplement to the EIR, or an addendum. As such, the EIR has been prepared to address the potential environmental impact of all phases of the Project.

The Draft EIR identified a range of potential impacts resulting from approval of the Project. Some of these impacts are analyzed in comparison to existing Zoological Park in Land Park in Sacramento. The impact areas come from the State's CEQA guidelines (the CEQA Checklist).

The EIR has identified the following environmental issue areas as having potentially significant environmental impacts from implementation of the Project:

- Aesthetics
- Air Quality
- Biological Resources
- Cultural and Tribal Resources
- Energy
- Greenhouse Gas Emissions
- Geology and Soils

- Hazards and Hazardous Materials
- Hydrology and Water Quality
- Land Use
- Noise
- Public Services
- Transportation
- Utilities and Service Systems

Conclusions to the potential impacts are classified as either less than significant, less than significant after incorporation of mitigation measures, or significant and unavoidable. Significant and unavoidable impacts do not limit the City's ability to approve a project. Rather, given CEQA's role in providing disclosure of potential impacts, the City may approve a project with significant impacts that cannot be mitigated to a less than significant level. CEQA Guidelines Section 15093 states that "CEQA requires the [City] to balance, as applicable, the economic, legal, social, technological, or other benefits, including region-wide or statewide environmental benefits, of a proposed project against its unavoidable environmental risks when determining whether to approve the project. If the specific economic, legal, social, technological, or other benefits, including region-wide or statewide environmental benefits, of a proposed project outweigh the unavoidable adverse environmental effects, the adverse environmental effects may be considered 'acceptable.' When the [City] approves a project which will result in the occurrence of significant effects which are identified in the final EIR but are not avoided or substantially lessened, the [City] shall state in writing the specific reasons to support its action based on the final EIR and/or other information in the record. The statement of overriding considerations shall be supported by substantial evidence in the record." A statement of overriding considerations is necessary to approve the General Plan Update as two impacts, Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Transportation, remain significant and unavoidable after application of all feasible mitigation measures.

On January 5, 2024, the City released the Draft EIR. The Draft EIR was made available for public review and comment on the City's website, at City Hall, and at the Elk Grove library for a period of 45 days. Public comments on the Draft EIR were due to the City on February 20, 2024. Comments were received from five agencies and 35 individuals on the content of the Draft EIR. Responses to these comments have been prepared by staff and are included in the Final EIR.

The Final EIR also includes an erratum of changes to the Draft EIR as a result of the public comments on the Project, the comments to the Draft EIR, and other revisions to the Project as identified by the City. The Final EIR indicates that the modifications to the Project are minor in nature and do not cause any change in significant impacts that were analyzed in the Draft EIR.

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council hereby finds that there is a compelling reason to deviate from the current guidelines of the City's Naming Policy, finds that such guidelines shall not apply to the New Zoo or any of its buildings, facilities, or structures, delegates naming authority for any of the New Zoo's buildings, facilities, or structures to the City Manager, with the exception of the New Zoo itself, which naming authority shall remain vested with the City Council.

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Introduction

This Financing Plan addresses the needs for Phases 1A and 1B of the proposed New Zoo in Elk Grove. This plan outlines the cost of constructing the on and off-site improvements, including soft and hard costs, and identifies various funding sources to meet these costs. The proposed New Zoo is a regional project that will require not just local funding by the City of Elk Grove but also partnership with people and organizations from around the region to make the project a reality. This Financing Plan is feasible and realistic and will help make the New Zoo a reality. The goal is to create a world-class zoo that will be a source of pride for the community and a destination for visitors from around the region and beyond.

Within this Financing Plan, various funding sources are the responsibility of the City, the Sacramento Zoological Society (the Zoological Society, or Society), other agencies through their existing impact fee programs, and various donors or regional collaborations. This Financing Plan does not seek to specifically identify the donors or regional collaborations but rather identify the Project needs. As discussed later in the Plan, various stages of the Project cannot move forward until the non-City funding sources are secured.

As noted, this Financing Plan only addresses the costs for Phases 1A and 1B of the proposed New Zoo. Financing for the later phases will likely require preparing other finance plans as applicable. This Financing Plan also does not address the annual maintenance obligations for the operation of the New Zoo once constructed. According to the feasibility study, the New Zoo would not require an operating subsidy. The annual maintenance and operational costs are the sole responsibility of the Zoological Society. An operational analysis has been prepared by the Society and is available separately.

Overview of the Project

The proposed New Zoo at Elk Grove Project involves the construction of a new zoological park and associated facilities and activities on an approximately 100-acre site at the northwest corner of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway.

The zoological park would include various facilities and buildings to be developed in phases. The main facility would be on approximately 65 acres and designed to support an average annual attendance of between 1.1 and 1.6 million visitors. The facility would be organized into four primary zones: Green Corridor, Africa, California, and Australasia. The Green Corridor would be the main pedestrian pathway through the New Zoo.

The Project is divided into four broad phases, which include the following:

- Phase 1 of the Project would involve constructing the Green Corridor and Africa. However, specific
 animal habitats within these zones may be phased depending on project funding. Phase 1A would
 include the base Zoo footprint, and Phase 1B would consist of additional zoological features as
 shown in the Project Plans. Phase 1C would include the hippopotamus and additional savannas in
 the site's northwest corner.
- **Phase 2** of the Project would include the California zone with exhibits at the southeast portion of the site. The California zone would consist of restrooms, a possible rehab and rescue facility, a building for changing exhibits, and an education building. Additional overnight guest accommodations, with views of animal habitats and holding areas, may also be included.
- **Phase 3** would construct a permanent administration office building, replacing the modular buildings in Phase 1. The Administration building would be between the California zone and the entry complex. The building(s) would be no more than three stories tall.
- Phase 4, the Australasia zone, would be located north of the Animal Care building near the site's
 northeast corner. Additional overnight guest accommodations may also be included, with views
 of animal habitats and holding areas.

Each phase may include one or more sub-phases. For example, Phase 1 has been divided into 1A, 1B, and 1C.

This Financing Plan focuses on the cost and needs for Phases 1A and 1B. Future phases (1C, 2, 3, and 4) will require additional financial planning.

Focus of Phases 1A and 1B




Figure 1: Phases 1A and 1B of the Proposed Project

This Financing Plan focuses on Phases 1A and 1B. These phases were selected because they involve the development of the core Project facilities, including the entry complex, the animal care and nutrition center, major guest services and amenities (dining complexes), and landmark species, including giraffe, okapi, gelada, lion, and cheetah. It also includes the construction of the necessary offsite infrastructure to serve the Project, including the extension of roadways, water, sewer, and dry utilities, parking facilities, and pedestrian and bicycle facilities. Details on the elements of Phases 1A and 1B are available in the Project plans and are illustrated in Figure 1.

The approach for Phases 1A and 1B is similar to that described in the 2022 Feasibility Study. However, the Feasibility Study did not address the offsite infrastructure necessary to serve the site, nor did it include all the planned guest amenities and support services for the Project.

Cost Estimates

During the development of the Project, multiple rounds of cost estimates were prepared. This allowed for tracking the Project design relative to the cost targets anticipated in the Feasibility Study. It also allowed for value engineering of the Project design and adjustment of the Project program.

The cost estimates presented in this Financing Plan are based upon the final Schematic Design plan set (dated Fall 2023) and were completed in January 2024. They are priced based on current market conditions, meaning they are based upon similar work and material types for recent construction projects (e.g., paving costs are based upon recent paving work on recent projects). As the Project moves forward into the next round of design work (Design Development and Construction Design), additional estimates will be prepared to ensure alignment between the vision and Project budget.

The costs are divided into two components: on-site and off-site.

- On-site costs include construction of the Zoo, including animal habitats and holding areas, the
 animal care center (veterinary and nutrition facilities), guest facilities and amenities (e.g., gift
 shops, restaurants, restrooms, plazas), and office and storage/maintenance facilities. This
 component also includes public art, impact fees, and the north and south parking lot and related
 drive aisles.
- Off-site costs include public roadways (Lotz Parkway, Kammerer Road, Classical Way, and B Street), water and sewer infrastructure, an off-site storm water detention basin and associated drainage pipelines, and dry utilities (electrical and telecommunications) to the site.

Costs are further divided into four major categories:

- **Construction Costs** are the costs involved in constructing the improvements. These include materials and labor, which are generally paid to the construction contractor.
- Contingency is an additional budget identified to account for changes in the design or other costs
 associated with the Project that have been unidentified when the estimate was prepared.
 Contingency is calculated as a percentage of the construction cost estimate. Early in the design
 process, a high contingency percentage is utilized; as the design is finalized and more details are
 resolved, the construction costs are refined (and may increase), and the contingency percentage
 is reduced. At the current Schematic Design stage, a 15-30% contingency is utilized, depending
 upon the project component.
- **Soft Costs** are non-construction-related and include design fees, construction management services, fees paid for plan review and inspection or by governmental agencies or impact fees for shared infrastructure, and expenses for furniture, fixtures, and equipment to outfit the Project. In some cases, soft costs are based upon a percentage of the estimated construction costs; in others, they are based upon an estimate of fees or charges expected based on the best available information when the estimate is prepared.
- Escalation is anticipated increases in construction costs due to inflation or other increases in labor
 or material costs from the time the estimate is prepared until, generally, the mid-point of
 construction. The escalation factor utilized is based upon the category of the improvement (i.e.,
 on-site, off-site) and the anticipated timeframe before the improvement can be constructed (e.g.,

2025-2026 for off-site infrastructure or 2026-2028 for on-site improvements), and historical market trends for increases in construction cost.

Table 1 summarizes the combined costs for Phase 1A and 1B. Of the On-site component, the total costs for the Zoo, exclusive of parking facilities, public art, and impact fees, is approximately \$226 million.

Sources and Uses of Funding

A wide range of funding sources have been identified for the proposed New Zoo Project. These include:

- Development Impact Fee Programs
- City Pay-Go
- Community Partnerships
- Bond Financing

Table 2 summarizes the funding sources identified to achieve the \$302 million Project cost identified in Table 1.

Development Impact Fee Programs

The City, Sacramento County Water Agency (SCWA), and SacSewer collect impact fees from new development to pay for new infrastructure in developing areas of their service territory. For example, the City collects a Roadway Fee to help finance certain new roadway construction costs. SCWA's and SacSewer's funds apply to qualifying water and sewer infrastructure. These funds are available as credit or reimbursement to a developer to construct this infrastructure.

Based upon the cost estimates prepared for the off-site infrastructure and after review of the three qualifying fee programs and their reimbursement methodologies, the City has identified funds of nearly \$15 million to pay for this infrastructure. Of this total, \$10,684,302 is City Roadway Fee, \$3,641,868 is SCWA fees, and \$670,296 is SacSewer Fees.

For the City Roadway Fees, a minor modification to the 2022 Roadway Fee Program will be necessary to clarify the eligible facilities. Additionally, the City Council may decide to augment the list of eligible facilities in the Roadway Fee Program to include the frontage along Lotz Parkway and Road B, increasing the available funds from the current \$10,684,302. Allocation of these funds to the Project's off-site infrastructure would not impact credits or reimbursements due to developers in the short term. However, it may impact the availability of funds for other City-delivered infrastructure.

The SCWA and SacSewer funds would be available to reimburse the City for construction. Generally, this reimbursement occurs either through the issuance of fee credits or as cash reimbursement. The City has previously secured cash reimbursement for City-delivered SCWA infrastructure, though it happened over a seven-year payback period. For SacSewer funds, the City has previously been issued fee credits, which it then obligated developers to buy and apply to their projects through conditions of approval. For the proposed Project, the City will seek fee credits (to the extent impact fees are charged on the Project) and cash reimbursement for the total costs. To the extent cash reimbursement is available, the City will seek to secure full reimbursement within 24 months of acceptance of the improvements by the applicable agency. As the off-site infrastructure is planned to be constructed in advance of the completion of the onsite improvements, this 24-month period will be sufficient to manage the overall cash flow on the construction costs of the Project.

City Pay-Go

The City has various one-time sources that can contribute to the Project. These sources are identified and explained below, and their potential contribution is summarized in Table 3.

- **General Fund Reserve Funds**. The City maintains multiple reserve accounts, funded from the General Fund, to be used for various purposes as the need arises. Two of these funds are the Capital Reserve and the Economic Development Opportunity Reserve. These Reserve programs are separate from the Economic Uncertainty Reserve, or "rainy day fund," which assists with navigating future economic uncertainty, cash flow needs, and emergency and disaster recovery. Instead, these funds are used for special projects, acquisitions, or other needs the City Council identifies. The proposed reserve funds for the Project are described below. Details of the City's Reserve Policy are available in City Council Resolution 2019-083.
 - Capital Reserve Fund. The Capital Reserve Fund is used for long-term capital projects, such as major facility construction or remodels. It is not used for ongoing maintenance needs.
 - Economic Development Fund. This fund is used for economic development opportunities. This particular reserve is newer than the Capital Reserve, so it has a lower fund balance.
 - Opportunity Reserve. This fund can be used for projects, acquisitions, or unforeseen events/needs.

- Casino Payments. In 2016, the City and the Wilton Rancheria entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) related to their then-proposed entertainment and gaming facility, what is now Sky River Casino. Under the terms of the MOU, the Tribe is obligated to make various payments to the City, either in lieu of impact fees normally charged on a development project or in lieu of property and sales taxes generated on the property.
 - Casino Roadway Payment. This payment may be used for Citywide roadway improvements including, but not limited to: Kammerer Road widening and extension, Lotz Parkway, Whitelock Parkway Interchange, Grant Line Road, traffic signals, and intersection improvements. Note that this is separate from an additional "regional roadway contribution" for regional or shared roadways with the County, including Kammerer Road and Grant Line Road, which has not been included in this Financing Plan.
 - Casino Community Facilities Payment. This payment provides funds "for the construction
 of other community facilities at the City's discretion." It is not a required mitigation for
 the Casino project; instead, it is an additional voluntary payment of the Tribe to the
 community.
 - Casino Tax In Lieu Payments (years 1, 2, and 3). According to the MOU, the Tribe must pay an in-lieu amount toward City tax revenue since the Casino is exempt from local taxation. Over the first three years of Casino operations, \$6,500,000 is due to the City. Note that funds beyond year three are addressed in the proposed Bond Financing section later in this Financing Plan.
- Community Facilities Districts CFD. Mello-Roos Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) are formed
 to finance the construction or acquisition of certain designated capital facilities (infrastructure)
 and public services by levying special taxes on properties in the CFD. There are several CFDs in the
 City of Elk Grove. Two such districts have been identified as potential sources for financing the
 proposed Project.
 - Poppy Ridge CFD. This CFD's infrastructure component is used to fund construction or reconfiguration of various public facilities, including public facility improvements, including parks. The City has reviewed the formation documents for this CFD and has determined that the proposed Project qualifies as a park facility and, as such, is eligible for these funds. There are no outstanding developer reimbursements due from this CFD, and it would not result in park facilities being delayed or eliminated, as all of the park facilities in Poppy Ridge have already been constructed. These are funds separate from maintenance funds over those needed for debt service and any planned City projects.
 - Laguna Ridge CFD. The Laguna Ridge CFD infrastructure program provides for the construction of various street improvements and other public facilities generally within the Laguna Ridge and Sterling Meadows neighborhoods, which are named in the CFD formation documents. Lotz Parkway is a named facility and is located immediately adjacent to the Sterling Meadows neighborhood. As such, some of these funds may be used to construct Lotz Parkway. According to the Laguna Ridge CFD Guiding Principles, a portion of the CFD proceeds are specifically assigned to the City for expenditure. These are funds separate from maintenance funds over those needed for debt service and any planned City projects.
- Tree Mitigation Fee Program. The City maintains a Tree Mitigation Fee Program, which collects funds from the removal of qualifying trees in the City as part of development projects and uses

them to plant new trees around the community. As part of this Financing Plan, a portion of the available fees would be used to plant trees around the Project site, including in the landscape corridors along roadways, roadway medians, and within the Zoological Park.

Measure A. Measure A is a sales tax program administered by the Sacramento Transportation
Authority, a Joint Powers Authority of the County, to fund various roadway construction and
maintenance efforts. Certain roadway improvements, including Classical Way and Road B, are
eligible for expenditure within the capital expenditures portion of the Measure A program.

To the extent the City spends down the above-listed fund sources, many of which are General Fund, the amount of interest the General Fund earns will commensurately decrease. However, the feasibility and economic impact studies indicated various economic benefits to the region and the City, including additional sales and transient occupancy taxes, which would offset some or all of the forgone interest earnings.

Community Partnerships

The proposed New Zoo is a regional facility and will require community partnerships from across the region. The original Feasibility Study articulated initial concepts for addressing this need. This Financing Plan divides the partnership opportunities into three broad categories. Table 4 summarizes the targeted partner funding for each category.

- Energy efficiency opportunities. These opportunities focus on energy efficiency programs and
 design features across the Project site, including solar photovoltaic systems and electric vehicle
 (EV) charging infrastructure. Under this opportunity, the City and Zoological Society would work
 to secure a partner that would help fund and construct these components. Opportunities include,
 but are not limited to, utility companies, solar and EV infrastructure companies, and various State
 and Federal grant programs.
- **Animal care opportunities**. Because of the Project's unique nature, various animal care-related programs, services, educational institutions, non-profits, and companies are targets for assisting with funding the animal care facilities within the Project, principally the veterinary hospital.
- **Zoological Society partnership responsibilities**. This category consists of funds identified and collected specifically by the Zoological Society. Under the terms of the draft agreement between the City and the Society, the Society is specifically responsible for securing these funds from various donors.

The City and Society will work jointly to identify prospective partners and secure funding for the Energy Efficiency and Animal Care Opportunities. The Society is solely responsible for its partnership responsibilities.

Within the Society's responsibilities category, the Society shall be given credit for the \$1,657,374 in Design Development Costs that they have spent in Winter and Spring 2024. These expenses are included in the soft cost portion of the On-Site Zoo Facilities costs as they are eligible design costs. Other Society costs to date relative to the overall site master plan and Schematic Design, which total \$4,272,425, are excluded from potential credit as they were costs anticipated in the May 2022 Memorandum of Understanding between the City and Society for project visioning costs and planning and environmental clearance tasks.

Bond Financing

After accounting for the development impact fees, City funding opportunities, and community partnerships, there is a remaining Project cost of \$114,506,548. This Financing Plan proposes to complete the Project financing with bond funds utilizing tax-exempt financing, which is the most cost-effective form of financing available to the City. Tax issues surrounding concessionaires, zoo management, and naming rights need to be carefully considered when structuring the bond issuance to conform to Internal Revenue Service rules regarding the uses of tax-exempt financing. If portions of the Project are found to require taxable debt, that would increase financing costs since taxable bond interest rates are .75%-1% higher than tax-exempt rates. It is also important to note that the scenarios below assume the City maintains its "AA" credit rating, which is a crucial component of how much interest the City is charged on the debt it issues. To address concerns about new construction risks from investors and rating agencies, a conservative strategy involving the use of 24 months of capitalized interest was included in the scenarios. This strategy rests on the premise that the City will have insufficient essential assets at the beginning of the financing period. Furthermore, it presupposes that bond-funded projects will not be prepared for utilization or occupancy within the initial 24 months.

With the assistance of its bond financing team, the City prepared multiple scenarios considering the term, interest rate, structure, and prospective funding sources for repayment of bond principal and interest. The team modeled an issuance that would yield a \$114.5 million project fund and took into account the current interest rate environment for tax-exempt financing, which is around 4.25% for an organization with a "AA" credit rating, which Elk Grove has. We are cautiously optimistic that the interest rate environment will improve if the Federal Reserve lowers interest rates later this year, as markets expect. The \$114.5 million scenario yielded an average annual repayment of \$7,804,958. The total amount of debt service, including costs of issuance, principal, and interest (including capitalized interest), is approximately \$218.5 million.

If we assume the Project does not require bond funds until 2027 or 2028, interest rates will likely be lower than the 4.25% assumed in the above scenario. Assuming the same-sized project fund of \$114.5 million is needed, the reader can understand how rates affect the annual debt service payments.

To the extent interest rates decrease and/or the amount needed to finance is lower, the City's debt service costs will decrease as the Society's contribution is fixed at \$2.5 million.

The following funding sources are available to repay the bond:

City Sources

- Casino Tax In Lieu Payments (after Year 3). As mentioned, the City and Wilton Rancheria have entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) related to the Sky River Casino. One portion of that agreement provides that the Casino make annual payments in lieu of taxes that would otherwise be collected on that project. While years 1, 2, and 3 of those payments are accounted for earlier in this Financing Plan, payments for years 4 and beyond are available to meet the bond obligations. These payments are in addition to the payments intended to offset impacts to law enforcement and traffic and have not been identified for any specific purpose.
- Revenue Neutrality Payment. Sacramento County withholds a portion of the City's property tax revenues (the withholding is treated as a payment) as part of the annexation agreement. The final payment is due in FY 2025, so the City can apply these payments towards the Project bonds.
- Costco Development Incentive Payoff. In 2017, the City and The Ridge EG East, LP, entered into an <u>Economic Development Incentive Agreement</u> for the Costco project on Elk Grove Boulevard. While the term of the Incentive Agreement was 25 years, the City completed its obligations and made the final payment last fiscal year. The City could apply

the equivalent annual payment from the Incentive Agreement towards the bond payment.

- Laguna Palms Debt Service. The City has outstanding debt on its Laguna Palms properties
 that will mature in Fiscal Year 2027. The equivalent payment can be applied toward the
 Project bonds.
- Zoological Society Sources. This funding source for the bond repayment would be the exclusive responsibility of the Zoological Society. The Society would remand the funds to the City annually. The Society would have exclusive discretion on the funding source, including donations, ticket revenue or surcharge, or other sources. The Project cost estimate does not include funding for the equipment to charge end users for parking at the Zoo; the included costs are for signage and wayfinding technologies to inform patrons of available parking. In other words, at this time, guests cannot be directly charged for parking under the current Project design and cost estimate. Should the Society add such pay for parking equipment, that cost would be their sole expense and separate from any costs listed here.

- The bond is issued at a lesser interest rate than the 4.25% scenario used in this Plan.
- At some point during the term of the bond, interest rates are sufficiently lower than at the time of the initial issuance such that refinancing the bond is of financial benefit to the City and Society.

Summary of City Financial Participation

As shown, many sources are included to fund the proposed Project. When specifically looking at the City's share, exclusive of development impact fees, the City contributes 57% towards the overall costs. This includes the City Pay-Go and 68% of the total Bond proceeds. This percentage is lower (39%) when excluding funding elements related to the Wilton Rancheria MOU.

Managing Risk

Several points of risk exist within the Project and this Financing Plan. Major risk points include:

- The Proposed City Funding Opportunities and Annual Bond Repayment Sources represent a significant financial investment by the City and utilize most of the City's discretionary project reserves as well as recurring revenue that could be used for other projects. However, none of the funds are necessary to support ongoing City operations, and the use of these funds should not impact City services. Further, this Financing Plan does not require or propose using any Measure E funds, and those funds will continue to be used to support the community's highest priorities. Finally, absent a severe economic downturn or a "black swan" event that impacts the City's finances, the City should continue to fully fund and maintain its Economic Uncertainty Reserve, which represents 25% of adjusted appropriations, equaling over \$22.7 million at the beginning of the current fiscal year.
- Increasing construction costs (labor and materials), which are largely outside of the City and Society's control.
- Increases in bond financing costs, which are mostly outside of the City and Society's control.
- Design and construction challenges or elements for which the cost estimates to date may not fully reflect.
- Challenges in securing partner funding at the minimum levels identified in this Financing Plan.

While not all risks can be removed from a project, especially one as large and complex as the New Zoo Project, there are steps the City and Society can take to manage this risk. Specific management tools and techniques included within this Financing Plan include the following.

- Prepare additional cost estimates throughout the Design Development and Construction Design
 phases. This will help to ensure that as more details about the Project are included within the
 Project plans, these costs can be accounted for and tracked against the total Project cost identified
 in this Plan.
- 2. Securing the services of a Construction Management firm to assist with refinements to the Project plans and to incorporate means and methods for the construction of the Project into future estimates. Estimates to date are based upon the services of a construction estimate firm experienced in zoo projects and a local civil engineering firm. The cost estimates can be improved if they are prepared by the contractor or construction management firm selected to build the Project. The construction management firm may also recommend changes that reduce the construction costs while still providing the finished result called for in the Project design. The City is working to secure the Construction Manager At Risk process as the preferred method for construction of the Project, which will streamline this process, bring the prime contractor onboard sooner (targeting fall 2024), and provide a guaranteed maximum price for the Project.
- 3. As noted, the City has identified a maximum payment for the bond issuance for the Project. Bond funds are not required for the Project until most on-site facilities are placed into construction. The City will not issue the bonds and proceed with on-site facility construction unless thencurrent bond rates and/or the amount needed to finance are at a level that allows the City to afford the annual payment. As of the date of this Financing Plan, current interest rates for tax-exempt financing are at a rate that results in an affordable payment and appear to be trending downward.

- 4. Partner funding is critical to the overall financial position of the Project. The City and Society will need to coordinate fundraising activities and market the Project to a wide range of potential partners. The timing of these funds is of paramount importance. To address this:
 - a. The Society has agreed to a schedule for securing their portion of the partner funding, with 25% necessary at time of Project approval (spring 2024) and 100% due prior to onsite construction. Additional interim milestones have also been identified, which allows for tracking of the funding progress relative to progress in completing construction design.
 - b. Many non-profit construction projects, such as museums and other zoos, often do not secure all their partner funding until after project construction has begun, or some partner funding may be spread over several calendar years. Recognizing this, the Society will work to identify the cash flow requirements of these funds once the actual donations are better known and identified beyond the Project approval date. The Society will seek to identify incremental funding relative to the construction fund needs and any potential short-term borrowing that could be pledged against the outstanding pledge commitments.
- 5. The City and Society have identified a Preview Phase focused on the Giraffe Lodge, a portion of the south savannah, and the Giraffe and hoof stock barns. The intent of the Preview Phase is to advance a core element of the Project in a way that can showcase the opportunity to potential community partners. An additional benefit of the Preview Phase is that it reduces some of the potential exposure to escalation in construction costs. From an operations perspective, the animals included in the Preview Phase do not require the Animal Care Center and the staffing costs are manageable, allowing the Society to operate both the New Zoo and the Land Park location simultaneously. However, this phasing approach does open the possibility that a significant delay could occur between the completion of the Preview Phase and the full Phase 1A and 1B improvements, leading some to wonder about the ability of the City and Society to deliver the Project. To manage this risk, the City and Society will need to consider the timing of community partnership funding and the remaining required commitments before initiating construction of the Preview Phase.

Implementation and Next Steps

This section describes the overall implementation of this Financing Plan and the necessary financial steps to complete the Project.

- The City and Society will prepare an agreement to memorialize terms and conditions for financing the Project and roles and responsibilities for delivering the Project. *Deadline: Spring 2024 as part of Project approvals.*
- The City will work with SCWA and SacSewer on agreements relative to fee obligations, credits, and reimbursement for constructing their facilities as part of the Project. Target date: Fall 2024/Winter 2025
- As of July 1, 2024, sufficient City funds are on hand to proceed with Design Development and Construction Design work for the Off-Site Facilities. The City will proceed with developing Capital Improvement Program projects for these elements and moving forward with these phases of work. There are also sufficient funds available over the next five years to proceed with constructing these facilities. Target dates: beginning in mid-2024, with completion targeted for 2027.

On-Site Facilities

- Sufficient City and Society funds are available to advance Design Development and Construction Design for the on-site facilities. Target dates: This work can begin in 2024 and continue through 2026.
- On-Site Facility construction may occur in phases (the Preview Phase, then the balance of Phases 1A and 1B) based upon securing Community Partner funding. *Target dates: This work could begin in late 2025/early 2026 for the Preview Phase, with the balance beginning in late 2026/early 2027. The objective is to open the Preview Phase in 2027 and the balance of the Project in 2029.*

New Zoo at Elk Grove Financing Agreement Terms

- The City of Elk Grove (City) shall retain ownership of the New Zoo site and its improvements.
- The Sacramento Zoological Society (Society) shall be the operator of the New Zoo. The City and Society shall enter into an Operating Agreement at a later date that will specify the operational terms and conditions of the New Zoo.
- The Financing Agreement is limited to development of Phases 1A/1B of the New Zoo (the Project). Future phases will be subject to separate financing plan(s) at a later date.
- The City shall be responsible for overseeing the design development, construction design, project bid, award, and delivery. Design decisions shall be in consultation with the Society.
- The current estimated Total Cost of the Project is \$302,343,307.
- Of the Total Cost, the Society is responsible for cultivating certain donor fundraising and assisting with repayment of the Bond, which is described more below.
- The Society is responsible for cultivating donor fundraising in a total amount of \$50,000,000.
 - The Society shall receive credit towards their fundraising obligation in the amount of \$1,657,374, as this is cost expended by the Society towards design development in the first half of 2024.
 - The fundraising shall be documented in an agreement or other form satisfactory to the City. Such documentation shall be made available to the City for review.
 - o The Society shall, at a minimum, achieve the fundraising on the following schedule:
 - By May 8, 2024: \$12,500,000
 - By January 1, 2024: \$17,500,000
 - By May 1, 2025: \$27,500,000
 - By January 1, 2026: \$30,000,000
 - By May 1, 2025: \$40,000,000
 - By January 1, 2027: \$50,000,000
 - If fundraising milestones are not met, City may suspend design work until required fundraising is achieved.
 - The City and Society shall establish a process for the transfer of the Society fundraising to the City for payment of design and construction costs. The timing of these transfers shall be coordinated with timing of construction such that sufficient

- funding is available to pay for the construction activities.
- Donations to the Project may include cash contributions or material donations. The
 City and Society shall establish a process for the acceptance of material donations
 consistent with City policy and that aligns with the contractual obligations of the
 Project contractor.
- Cash donations may be associated with naming or sponsorship rights for one or more portions of the Project. The Society may solicit for naming and sponsorship for the Project, subject to approval by the City consistent with the City's Naming Policy.
- Of the Total Cost, the City and Society shall jointly solicit fundraising towards energy efficient and animal care facilities within the Project in a total amount of \$30,000,000.
- The City has identified various one-time funds for design and construction of the Project,
 which are described in the Financing Plan, and total \$107,836,759.
- As provided in the Project Financing Plan, it is anticipated that the City would secure a
 Bond, in an amount of approximately \$114,506,548, to complete the funding necessary for
 the Project. Based upon an interest rate of 4.25%, the annual payment for this Bond would
 be \$7,804,958. The City and Society would split the Bond repayment as follows:
 - Ocity portion: 68%, or approximately \$5,420,000 annually
 - Society portion: 32%, or approximately \$2,500,000 annually
- The Society is solely responsible for financing the operations and maintenance of the Project.

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1. INTRODUCTION

Relevant Strategies and Solutions (RS&S) is pleased to provide a business plan update as a supplement to the feasibility study completed in 2022 for the new Zoo in Elk Grove. The purpose of this business plan update is to provide relevant attendance, admissions, and pro forma operating projections based on current value propositions and pricing/revenue strategies, as well as a staffing plan.

The truly once-in-a-lifetime opportunity of building a new zoo has been realized through a combination of visionary leadership, executive commitment, knowledgeable input from zoo experts, and support from donors and friends. We are confident that the new Zoo in Elk Grove will incorporate best-in-class thinking, design, and practices to create unparalleled animal and visitor experiences.

The first phase of the new Zoo in Elk Grove (inclusive of Phases 1A and 1B as more fully described below) will achieve the following:

- For the animals spacious, naturalistic, dynamic, and invigorating habitats and state-of-the-art animal care facilities;
- For the visitors fresh, new, fully engaging, up-close-and-personal experiences facilitated by the latest design and technology and complemented by high-quality refreshment and dining/lodging options; and
- For the Elk Grove community a world-class zoo that will delight Elk Grove residents, support student learning, promote conservation and environmental awareness, contribute to the tax base, boost regional economic development, attract broad-based tourist interest, and enhance Elk Grove's standing as a highly desirable regional destination.

This initiative highlights the vision and ingenuity of the Board of the Sacramento Zoological Society and the City's leadership team. This study was developed through and with their keen interest and collegial collaboration. The project would not be possible without the strong and capable leadership of both the Society and the City. We thank the Society and the City for their support.

RS&S Scope of Work

RS&S was engaged by the Sacramento Zoological Society to work with its Elk Grove feasibility planning team to provide a business plan update to the 2022 Feasibility Study for the new Zoo in Elk Grove now that the leadership teams have agreed to the Phase One facility concept plans and the corresponding facility investments in site improvements, infrastructure, animal habitats and guest amenities. The Vision Plan created in 2022 remains relevant and applicable in representing the overall direction, plans, and goals for the new Zoo.

The update to the 2022 feasibility study focuses specifically on the following core elements:

- Reaffirming attendance projections;
- Updating financial operating projections and planning assumptions including source & use projections, updating pricing, revenue and funding strategies;
- Defining the public/private funding model and opportunities to support the facility investments; and
- Identifying key Funding Strategies to be implemented between May 2024 and the projected opening date (Spring 2029) to ensure the Zoo's financial and operating viability and sustainability.

Through the course of this work, our goal was to ensure that all of the planning steps integrated with each other so that the leadership of the City and the Society are empowered with a compelling vision, meaningful data, clear messaging, and actionable next steps to continue to move this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity forward.

Overview of Project

This Business Plan Update addresses the operating needs for Phases 1A and 1B of the proposed New Zoo in Elk Grove.

A Financing Plan created by the City of Elk Grove for Phases 1A and 1B of this project outlines the cost of constructing the on and off-site improvements, including soft and hard costs, and identifies various funding sources to meet these costs. Within the Financing Plan, various funding sources were identified as the responsibility of the City, the Sacramento Zoological Society, other agencies through their existing impact fee programs, and various donors or regional collaborations. The Financing Plan did not seek to specifically identify the donors or regional collaborations, but rather identified the Project needs. As discussed in the Financing Plan, various stages of the Project cannot move forward until the non-City funding sources have been secured. Financing for the later phases will require preparing other finance plans as applicable. The Financing Plan also did not address the annual maintenance obligations for the operation of the New Zoo once constructed. According to the feasibility study, the New Zoo would not require an operating subsidy. The annual maintenance and operational costs will be the sole responsibility of the Zoological Society.

Phase 1 of the Project, which is divided into four broad phases, includes construction of the Green Corridor and Africa. However, specific animal habitats within these zones may be phased depending on project funding. Phase 1A would include the base Zoo footprint, and Phase 1B would consist of additional zoological features as detailed in the Project Plans.

Focus of Phases 1A and 1B

Phases 1A and 1B involve the development of the core Project facilities, including the entry complex, the animal care and nutrition center, major guest services and amenities (dining complexes), and landmark species, including giraffe, okapi, gelada, lion, and cheetah. It also includes the construction of the necessary offsite infrastructure to serve the Project, including the extension of

roadways, water, sewer, and dry utilities, parking facilities, and pedestrian and bicycle facilities. Details on the elements of Phases 1A and 1B are available in the Project plans.

The approach for Phases 1A and 1B is similar to that described in the 2022 Feasibility Study. However, the Feasibility Study did not address the offsite infrastructure necessary to serve the site, nor did it include all the planned guest amenities and support services for the Project.

2. STRATEGIC BUSINESS PLAN

RS&S developed the updated attendance, pro forma financial projections, and staffing plan to support Phases 1A and 1B of the vision/concept plan for the new Zoo utilizing the Zoo's historical data from its operations at Land Park and RS&S's experience in creating sustainable and viable business plans for over 100 AZA clients over the years. We also carefully considered the value proposition in terms of the complete experience and benefits enjoyed by guests relative to the cost of admission as detailed below.

Value Proposition

The new Zoo will employ a multifaceted strategy aimed at balancing price value with overall attendance. One key element of this strategy is implementing a pricing model that incorporates parking into the general admission fees. By eliminating a separate parking fee system and instead building parking into the admission ticket price, the new Zoo increases the overall value of the ticket purchase for the visitor and simplifies and streamlines the visitors' arrival and exit experiences.

Moreover, the introduction of immersive exhibits, interactive experiences and entertainment features such as live music, further enhances the value proposition for visitors. These elements enrich the visitor experience and attract a broader audience demographic, thereby sustaining attendance and creating repeat visits. The added features, amenities, and experiences also impact visitor stay time, with projected increases in average visitor stay time extending from the current 1.5 hours at the existing Land Park site to at least 2.5 hours at the new Elk Grove site. The launch phase of the new Zoo is expected to result in an initial surge in visitor volume due to the novelty of these offerings, which will settle into a sustained and steady flow of visitors over time.

It is essential to strike the right balance between price value and attendance. A careful analysis of market dynamics, competitor pricing, and visitor feedback informed the pricing decisions aimed at maximizing revenue while maintaining accessibility.

Ultimately, the success of the new Zoo hinges on its ability to deliver compelling experiences that justify the ticket price while attracting and retaining visitors. By prioritizing value-added offerings and carefully calibrating pricing strategies, the new Zoo can achieve sustainable growth in attendance, meeting its operating revenue needs and ensuring its continued relevance and impact within the community.

The average opening-year ticket price (five years out from now utilizing a dynamic pricing strategy) is projected to be \$39 for adults, \$36 for seniors, and \$30 for children. This pricing strategy reflects the added value of the new Zoo experiences and aligns with industry standards and inflationary pressures. It also ensures that the new Zoo remains economically sustainable while continuing to deliver enriching experiences for visitors of all ages.

Attendance Projections

Table 1 below details attendance projections for Phase 1 investments for the first five years of operation beginning in 2029. Assuming an annual baseline of 850,000 (representing an increase of ~63% increase over Land Park's 2024 attendance), opening year attendance is projected at 935,000, a 10% increase over the baseline. Year 2 is projected at 900,000 and Year 3 at 875,000 until attendance settles in at the baseline projections in Years 4 and 5. We remain confident that the new Zoo can exceed these projections, but proceed conservatively given that the projected opening is over 5 years into the future.

These projections are based on the following key business planning assumptions:

- Annual attendance distribution will be similar to the Land Park Site: key allocations 29% paid adults and 26% member visits.
- The business plan and attendance projections assume that Phase 1 of the vision/concept plan is fulfilled, plus an additional 10 acres for free parking. The Zoo will manage the parking lots with digital signage easing the parking transition for all guests and members.
- The vision/concept plan is implemented with high-quality animal exhibits and visitor amenities/experiences reflective of the City of Elk Grove's high standards for community projects that add value and enhance the quality of life for the residents of and visitors to the Elk Grove area.
- With a larger Zoo, expanded animal exhibits, increases in the number of animals, and adjacent parking, we believe the annual attendance projections are conservative, especially considering annual attendance of zoos in similar MSA communities and the high level of interest in and excitement about the new Zoo opening.
- We anticipate the Zoo will have approximately 24,000 household members upon opening of Phase 1 in 2029 (presold in 2028/2029) up from the current 13,500 household members in 2024 at Land Park. Of the 24,000 household members, we anticipate that approximately 8,400 households will be Elk Grove members which would represent appropriately 35% of the total household members. Members who reside outside of Elk Grove would comprise 15,600 households.
 - We would anticipate that Elk Grove residents would receive a 20% discount on the annual cost of a Zoo membership similar to the discounts that residents receive for other community amenities on the respective facility's annual pass program.
 - Members, with an average family size of 4, will visit on average 2.7 times a year higher in the initial years due to the appeal of the new Zoo, adding value to the Zoo's membership program.

- Average annual membership fees for individuals would range from \$90 \$112 and for families from \$180 \$225 in year 1 of the new Zoo.
- Total visitation assumes dynamic evening/events programs utilizing the compelling restaurant and event space that will overlook the new Savannah and that would be located near the main entry.

Note: the allocation of the new Zoo's annual attendance is consistent with the current allocation in 2024. The growth of visitation is supported by "the new" Zoo experience and habitats; adjacent free parking; ease of access from major highways and the City of Elk Grove; day/night visitation and experiences; and high-quality guest experiences that create a "repeat visit."

Admission Pricing Projections

Like its current admission policy at Land Park, the new Zoo will continue to manage its admission fees via a dynamic pricing structure. A dynamic pricing structure offers the Zoo flexibility and control based on varying factors such as season, day of week, capacity, visitor demand, exhibit openings, and shifts in day/night experiences. It enables, encourages, and incentivizes advance planning through online ticket purchases which provides ease of access and budgeting for visitors and allows for efficient staffing and operations for the Zoo.

The average first year admission fees with dynamic pricing will be as follows:

•	Adult	\$39

• Dynamic pricing will be utilized for all revenue venues through a fully integrated technology platform that can "bundle" fees for admission, experiences, and food/retail.

- Year 1 ranges reflect projected dynamic pricing based on the anticipated pricing thresholds and the value proposition as detailed earlier which includes:
 - a highly programmed guest experience with unique interactions, experiences (back-of-house, giraffe, rhino, okapi, among others),
 and engagements with high-quality guest amenities, increasing the average guest stay time to 2.5 hours from 1.5 hours currently at Land Park
 - Other value proposition considerations:
 - The additional exhibits, amenities, and experiences at Elk Grove, compared to Land Park
 - Free (included with admission) and easily accessible parking whereas no available parking at Land Park
 - An increase in the number of animals with larger, often mixed-species habitats.
 - The "new" factor Elk Grove will be the first completely new major public zoo built in the Unites States since 1988
 - An exciting roster offering seasonal day/night guest and animal experiences that will attract new audiences
- Year 1 pricing is consistent with the current dynamic pricing thresholds at Land Park for adults taking into consideration industry standards, inflationary pressures (\$2-3 annually), and the added value of the new Zoo experience.
- Year 1 pricing is also consistent with average ranges of similar AZA-accredited MSA zoos and in relation to other Sacramento cultural attractions.
- Average admission pricing is projected to increase in year 3 as fees are adjusted to reflect inflation and standard increases.

Operating Revenue & Expenses – Updated Pro Forma Projections

RS&S developed the five-year financial operating projections utilizing the vision/concept plan, site plan, and attendance/pricing projections and assumptions summarized above. We believe that the projections reflect a conservative planning approach. There are a number of key underlying financial assumptions that support the pro forma projections found in **Table 3** and reflect the first 5 years of operations:

- All <u>2029 dollars with full-year operations</u> in reality, first calendar year (2029) is a partial year with spring opening anticipated.
- <u>No capex investments</u> are programmed in the initial five years beyond Phases 1A and 1B although future phases could be funded and programmed, they are not "planned or anticipated" to be open in the initial five years.
- No annual operating support from the City of Elk Grove is programmed.
- The five-year projections identify a <u>viable and sustainable financial model</u> with annual net operating income projections that range from 7.6 of total operating revenues in year 1 to 3.4% in year 5.
- <u>Visitor per capita spending will increase</u> by 30% over the 2022 per cap with new and expanded food, dining, and retail venues. It is anticipated that the Society will continue its long-term relationship with the Zoo's current <u>food, retail and catering</u> partner, to manage and operate the new Zoo's food, catering, and retail venues.
- Salaries and benefits reflect approximately 55% of the Zoo's operating expenses in Year 1 within the AZA industry benchmark for large AZA institutions with similar management models.
- Total <u>non-payroll operating expenses</u> are projected in Year 1 at \$7.1MM as compared to the 2024 non-payroll allocation of \$3.1MM.
- The pro forma projections include <u>a Capital Reinvestment</u> allocation that could be utilized in part as a direct debt service allocation that would be paid to the City of Elk Grove to support the Zoo's capex investment of Phases 1A and 1B. In addition, annually this allocation supports maintenance and repair allocation of at least \$2MM annually.
- All expenses, except capital re-investments, have annual 3% increases programmed historically an industry benchmark assumption.
- The pro forma projections generate an annual operating reserve that ranges from 3.4% to 7.6% of total operating revenues. Such reserves, again from conservative revenue and expense projections, could be utilized in whole or combination of funding options to further reinvest in the Zoo, support a "rainy day" fund, build additional awareness, and/or fund additional guest experience initiatives.

- Admissions reflect the dynamic pricing structure with compelling value proposition.
- <u>Parking</u> is included in the price of admission.
- Membership fees reflect a baseline of <u>24,000 household</u> members.
- <u>Commissions</u> assumes a \$10/per cap with a blended 20.5% commission payment; catering commission is included in Events/Group Sales.
- Rides & Encounters: ride per cap aligns with current (2024) allocation with higher visitation includes additional back-of-house and animal engagements such as giraffe and rhino fee-based experiences, as well as VIP tours of the African Savannah.
- Animal Care 100% increase over current baseline (2024) proportional relative to animal and acreage increases.
- Marketing: ~\$1.1MM in <u>direct marketing/advertising/entertainment</u> value (6.1% of total gross admission revenues), increasing from \$124,000 in 2024. The Zoo will integrate with Elk Grove marketing initiatives to further leverage awareness and impacts. This investment level allows for expanded advertising reach across multiple channels, including print, radio, and television, and targeted promotional strategies to attract diverse audience segments. Furthermore, it facilitates the cultivation of strategic partnerships with tourism-related brands like Visit California, Expedia, Southwest Airlines, and Hilton, leveraging their reach to drive visitors and bolster brand recognition.
- <u>Annual Fund/Development</u>: operational programs are in alignment with current baseline with higher visitation and with continued focus on raising capex dollars that are not reflected in the pro forma projections.
- <u>Utilities</u>: ~\$1.1MM annually 4.5% of total operating expenses; in alignment with Fresno as % of total operating expenses and total dollar allocation in 2024; The new Zoo will have less "water" exhibits than Fresno. Current Zoo utilities in 2024 is \$400,000.
- Bank Fees: ~approximately \$450K in total annually allocated, although the overall cost should decline with electronic payments in the future.
- No UCD operating grants assumes that the <u>Zoo funds all Vet salaries</u> (~\$250,000 annually) with no offsets from UCD.
- Software allocations for admissions are included (\$165K) in baseline for Guest Services could be reallocated with outsourcing.

3. FUNDING STRATEGIES

Capital Investment

The Society is fully committed to securing capital investment (capex) pledges, gifts, and donations of a minimum of \$50MM in support of the total capex investment for Phases 1A and 1B as outlined above. The Society recognizes that the \$50MM in capex funding will most likely be paid out over an average of five to seven years, understanding that some gifts may be paid out over a shorter time period. The Society will work to identify the cash flow requirements of these capex investments once the actual donations are better known and identified beyond the May 8, 2024 project approval date. As the Society has indicated over the past months, a number of potential donors/pledges are seeking the approval of the new Zoo project moving forward (May 8, 2024) prior to fully committing to the Zoo's capex requests.

The Society will seek to identify incremental funding to support the source and use of the Society's capex investments with the construction fund needs and any potential short-term borrowings that could be pledged against the outstanding pledge commitments.

The Society anticipates that the \$50MM capex investments would come from the following sources:

Society Reserves/Resources
 15% - 20%

• Partner Commitments 20%

Naming Rights 20% - 40%
 Private Support * 25% - 40%

(*from Individuals, Corporations, Foundations, Others)

Naming rights represent an extraordinary opportunity for the new Zoo to engage individual and corporate involvement in this funding initiative. With the potential to raise significant support for the Zoo, securing a naming sponsor[s] would also succeed in generating enthusiasm, increasing awareness, and building confidence among the philanthropic community in the value and importance of the project. Naming rights, whether for the Zoo itself, an exhibit, or an amenity, could present a very attractive option for certain donors.

Risk Assessment of the Updated Operating Projections

The updated (March 2024) Operating Projections reflect a conservative planning approach with an annual attendance (visitation) baseline of 850,000 guests in year 1 – projected to be five years from today (2029). In the initial two operating years, annual attendance is anticipated to be 5% - 10% higher than the baseline due to the celebration and awareness of opening the new Zoo.

At an annual attendance baseline of 850,000 visitors, the new Zoo offers a high-quality, high-value guest experience with compelling, fun, and engaging animal habitats, experiences, and programs. In addition, the Zoo has allocated its operating expenses (staffing, marketing, animal care, facilities, and guest services) to support the high-quality, high-value experience with expense contingencies <u>AND</u> annually generating operating reserves from its operations.

- **Attendance**: low risk as the baseline is significantly below the current (2024) annual attendance of the Fresno Zoo (1MM visitors) within a smaller MSA market than Sacramento. The projected attendance assumes that paid adults, seniors, and children represent ~ 50% of the total visitors consistent with the Zoo's current (2024) visitor distribution.
- **Admission Per Caps**: low-to-mid-risk as we anticipate that per capita admissions will increase from \$12.28 (2024) to \$19.19 in year 1 a \$6.91 per cap dollar increase. ~\$1.47 of this increase can be attributed to the cost of parking that will be included in the general admission fees for each category. The additional projected increase is the result of the higher dynamic pricing structure for the adult, senior, and child fees over their current baseline in 2024.
 - As a worst-case scenario, if per capita spending was impacted by \$4 per visitor total of \$3.75MM in operating revenues, the Zoo would be able to offset these revenues through the realignment of salaries & benefits (\$1.5MM), capital reinvestment (\$1.3MM), marketing (\$500,000), and its operating reserves that range from 3.3% to 7.6% of total operating revenues in any one year.
 - o If annual attendance increases above the baseline of 850,000 visitors, the Zoo would generate an additional \$1MM+ in flow-thru operating dollars (with relatively low additional operating expenses).
- **Membership Fees**: <u>low-risk</u> conservatively assumed over 24,000 household members in year 1 an increase from 13,500 households in 2024. The opportunity to join the "new Zoo" with a strong value proposition will support the increase in household members.
- **Rides/Experiences**: <u>low-risk</u> we have assumed the same per capita spending (\$1.17) in year 1 as currently fulfilled at the current Zoo in 2024 revenue increase is reflective of the higher visitation while offering additional experiences and engagements above the current level at the Zoo in 2024.
- **Commissions from Partner**: <u>low-risk</u> as programmed at a blended 20.5% of gross operating revenues for food, retail, and catering dollars.
- **Staffing & Benefits:** <u>low-risk</u> as contingencies (7%) of total salaries and FTEs reflect full-time positions, recognizing that part-time/seasonal positions may be utilized. Animal and Facilities are fully staffed to support Phases 1A and 1B. Benefit allocation of 30% for all salaries and assumes all full-time positions.

- **Direct Debt Service Allocation:** low-risk as generated through operating funds and allocation could be lower with interest rate reductions, lower capex investments, and/or higher private/partner capex contributions. Need to identify "what if" scenarios with City leadership. Allocation included in the Capital Reinvestment budget.
- **Marketing:** <u>low-mid risk</u> as a double-edge as the Zoo needs to invest in building its awareness and brand while providing engaging animal and entertainment value. Potential savings in future years and could be lower if fully integrated with the City of Elk Grove's marketing, branding, and awareness initiatives.
- **Utilities:** <u>low-mid risk</u> as current annual allocation is \$1.1MM lower utilization could be plus; higher usage rates a negative. Projected allocation is 4.4% of the Zoo's total operating expenses compared to 3% at the Fresno Zoo which has more acreage and more demand to support its water filtration needs.


Sustainable Funding Opportunities

Below we have identified a few sustainable funding opportunities that have the potential to generate significant ongoing resources for the new Zoo from diverse sources:

- Pursue Naming Rights Sponsorship Opportunities
 - o Strategy to raise more capex dollars
 - o Significant source of untapped resources
- Bond the Society's Capex "Gaps" as part of the City's total package
 - Increases Zoo "direct debt service payment"
 - o Creates an "alternative funding" opportunity to "bridge pledges" and any additional or future funding needs
- Fully Promote and Invest in the Society's Planned Giving and Operating Endowment Initiatives
 - o Incorporate as part of the potential donor package with all funding commitments
 - o Adds additional "rainy day" funds to support the Zoo's operations and future phase capex investments

Once Phase 1A and 1B are designed and the construction timeline better defined (therefore, an opening date is set), a new Zoo "start-up/working capital" budget projection should be created, including resources for staffing and marketing/branding/awareness. The start-up budget would outline the impacts of opening a "preview" concept.

THE ZOO IN ELK GROVE ECONOMIC AND REVENUE IMPACT ANALYSIS



MARCH 2024

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Executive Summary

The Sacramento Zoo is currently located in William Land Park in the City of Sacramento on about 14.6 acres and, as of 2024, houses close to 380 animals. It has been in this location since its opening in 1927. The zoo is severely constrained in its current location. This analysis considers the construction of a new zoo in the City of Elk Grove, and is focused on completion of Phase 1A/1B, opening in 2029. The new facilities in Elk Grove would support the zoo's mission of conservation and animal welfare, as well as creating a premier destination for visitors.



This analysis quantifies the projected impact of zoo operations in Elk Grove. The proposed larger facility could allow the zoo to increase attendance by up to 80%, as well as provide adequate space for parking, additional animal species and exhibits, and opportunities for special events.

The operations of the Zoo in Elk Grove detailed in this analysis provide significant economic and educational benefits to the region. The assumptions regarding future zoo operations on which this economic impact is based were provided by the Sacramento Zoo and the city of Elk Grove.

- Based on projected annual attendance of more than 935,000 visitors per year in the opening year, and stabilized long-term attendance of 850,000 people per year, the new zoo could create a total economic impact of \$249 million in the city over the next five years.
- Zoo employment at the new facility is estimated at 140 to 144 people with an annual payroll of \$11 million to \$12 million, which represents a 37% increase over current employment levels. In addition, there could be 75 to 80 third-party employees of food and retail concession operators with an annual payroll of \$3 million.
- Through vendor purchases, employee spending, and visitor spending, the zoo could support 176 indirect and induced jobs and \$7.9 million in labor income each year at other businesses in Elk Grove, as well as 215 jobs and \$9.1 million in annual payroll in other parts of the metro area. Some of these impacts represent existing economic activity associated with the zoo that would simply shift to a new location, but a portion of the impacts would be new given the projected expansion of the zoo at the new site.
- There could be one-time construction impacts associated with the zoo relocation that are estimated at \$425 million along with 2,405 total jobs and \$171 million in labor income in Elk Grove and throughout the metro area during the construction period.
- Visitor and employee spending associated with the relocated zoo could generate an estimated \$4.0 million in city sales and transient lodging tax revenues, and \$9.4 million in county and state sales taxes over the next five years. Not all of the revenues to the county and state are net new, given the zoo's existing operations in Sacramento, but all of the city tax revenue would be new to Elk Grove.

This study constitutes an economic impact analysis and not a feasibility analysis. The city considered the potential environmental impacts in an Environmental Impact Report prepared for the project, set to be reviewed by the City Council later in 2024.

Introduction

This economic and revenue impact of the relocation of the zoo to Elk Grove is intended to provide a framework for understanding the benefits that this attraction could generate for the City of Elk Grove and the metro area, including the significant increase in impacts that could be realized if the zoo is able to construct a new facility on a significantly larger site. This analysis includes the impacts of the zoo operations, as well off-site visitor spending and employee spending. The results are based on projected visitor levels over the next five



years and projected operating revenues and expenditures for the zoo, using information provided by the City of Elk Grove and the Sacramento Zoo.

The Sacramento Zoo began operations in 1927 and has grown to include 14.3 acres and, as of 2024, houses approximately 380 animals. Its primary mission is animal welfare and conservation awareness through education and recreation. The Sacramento Zoo had approximately 521,000 visitors in 2023. With the new larger location, the zoo could support over 850,000 annual visitors at stabilized levels.

Non-local visitors generate a significant share of the zoo's economic and revenue impacts in the region. Although these visitors may only spend one day at the zoo, they make other local expenditures on food, lodging, transportation, entertainment and retail while they are in the region. In addition to visitor impacts, the zoo generates economic impacts through its local vendor purchases and through local spending by employees. The zoo currently directly employs 105 people with an estimated annual payroll of \$4.8 million. Employment could increase to 144 people and \$11.7 million in annual payroll at stabilized operating levels.

Visitor Spending

Total zoo attendance has increased from 490,000 visitors in 2017 to 521,000 visitors in 2023, and the number of annual visitors is projected to double at the proposed location in Elk Grove (Figure 1). This study assumes that 19% of the patrons are non-local, including those from other parts of the state and from outside California, based on the zip code distribution of zoo members. An estimated 86% of non-local visitors are from other parts of California, while the



remaining 14% come primarily from Nevada, Washington and Oregon.

In order to estimate the impacts of visitor spending by non-local visitors, it is necessary to have detailed data on daily spending habits. This analysis uses spending patterns from Visit California for the Gold Country region, which includes Sacramento County. The average visitor to the region spends approximately \$157 per person per day on food, lodging, local transportation, entertainment, and retail purchases (Figure 2). Applying these expenditure levels to the average annual number of non-local zoo visitors over the first five years of operations in Elk Grove results in projected off-site visitor expenditures of \$20.1 million per year, including lodging, food, retail and local transportation, and on-site expenditures of \$5.9 million per year. The off-site expenditures form the basis for the visitor spending impacts.



Economic Impacts

The projected economic benefits to the city of Elk Grove from a relocated zoo include on-going operations impacts, non-local visitor spending, and one-time construction impacts. Economic impacts measure the effects of economic stimuli, or expenditures, in the local economy. These impacts include direct, indirect, and induced jobs, labor income and output that could result from the new zoo. Indirect and induced impacts represent the multiplier effects and capture supported supplier and consumer businesses and their employees in Elk Grove and the Sacramento metro area that could benefit from the new zoo. Not all of the indirect regional impacts created by the zoo would be net new, although all of the direct impacts would be new to Elk Grove, and the overall level of impacts created by the zoo could increase significantly in this new location.

Construction Impacts

The total construction cost for the initial phase of the zoo (referred to as Phase 1A/1B) is \$302.3 million, including zoo facilities, soft costs and off-site infrastructure. An estimated \$243.7 million of this construction spending could be captured locally.

The multiplier effect of \$243.7 million in local construction spending could result in a total increase in economic activity of \$425.0 million during the construction period, of which an estimated 58% could be captured



on-site or elsewhere in the city of Elk Grove based on the economic impact results (Figure 3). The approximately 2,400 total jobs created by this construction project could result in \$170.9 million in labor income in the city and metro area during the construction period.

Operations Impacts

The operations impacts are grouped into direct, indirect, and induced impacts. Direct impacts include the on-site operations of the relocated zoo. Indirect and induced impacts include local vendor purchases made by the zoo and spending by employees. Induced impacts also include establishments where visitors make purchases. In turn, these local businesses and their employees make additional purchases that are captured in the total impact estimates. The total economic impacts are the sum of the direct impacts at the relocated zoo and the indirect and induced impacts created by other local businesses and their employees. The existing zoo in Sacramento makes economic contributions to the regional



economy that would be replaced by impacts at the relocated zoo. However, some of the impacts shown here are new, particularly the direct impacts that would be new to Elk Grove and both the local and regional impacts resulting from the significant expansion at the new site.

The indirect and induced impacts are called multiplier effects. Multiplier effects are a way of representing the larger economic effects on the local economy. The multiplier effects translate an increase in direct output (loosely defined for service industries as gross sales) into a corresponding increase in jobs, labor income and output. In essence, the multiplier effect represents the recycling of local spending. This recycling process creates new business opportunities. The multipliers used in this analysis are from IMPLAN, a national vendor of economic impact software, and are specific to the economic base of the City of Elk Grove and the Sacramento metro area. Industry-specific multipliers were used for each category of local spending.

Visitor Impacts

The primary source of on-going economic impacts created by the zoo comes from visitors. It is estimated that non-local visitors could spend an average of \$20.1 million per year locally on hotels, food, transportation, entertainment and retail outside the zoo based on projected attendance and typical visitor spending patterns. This increased spending could support an average annual induced impact of \$15.0 million in Elk Grove and an additional \$12.0 million in other parts of the metro area. Non-local visitor spending at the new location could also support an average of 130 induced jobs



and \$5.5 million in annual labor income in Elk Grove (Figure 4). Other Metro Area impacts capture induced impacts of spending outside of Elk Grove.

Employee Spending

In addition to impacts from vendor purchases and visitors, the relocated zoo could create economic impacts by virtue of its employees and payroll. A portion of employee payroll is spent at local establishments, and this in turn supports local businesses in Elk Grove.

To estimate the impact of employee spending, information is extracted from the IMPLAN model on spending patterns by households at income levels corresponding to zoo employees. These household consumption functions account for a wide range of products and services that are purchased by a typical household. Impacts created by the projected employees at the relocated zoo (an estimated 25% of whom could live in Elk Grove) average \$1.9 million per year in Elk Grove, directly and indirectly supporting 7 induced jobs at other local businesses (Figure 5). There are additional impacts elsewhere in the metro area, not all of which are net new. With the expanded operations and higher employment levels at the new location, employee spending could generate an induced impact of \$11.3 million per year, supporting an estimated 72 jobs throughout the metro area.

Summary of Operations Impacts

Figure 6 shows a summary of the projected annual economic impacts of the relocated zoo (excluding one-time construction impacts). Over the first five years of operations in Elk Grove, the relocated zoo could employ an average of 218 people, including employees of third-party concessionaires, with total payroll (labor income) of \$71.0 million and direct output of \$128.1 million over five years.

The economic impact also includes the indirect impacts of local vendor spending. Zoos make a significant amount of vendor purchases for professional services, maintenance services, utilities, and other items. Using IMPLAN economic multipliers,



we can estimate the economic impact of local vendor purchases captured in Elk Grove at \$36.7 million over five years, along with 40 jobs and \$11.2 million in labor income.

Local employee spending supports estimated induced impacts of \$9.3 million in output, 7 jobs and \$1.5 million in labor income over five years at other local businesses. Non-local visitor spending creates additional induced impacts estimated at \$75.1 million over five years, supporting 130 jobs and \$27.5 million in labor income in Elk Grove.

The total economic impact of the relocated zoo is estimated at \$249.2 million over five years, or an average of \$49.8 million per year, including the direct impacts of on-site operations and the indirect and induced impacts of off-site visitor spending, local vendor purchases, and employee spending. The proposed relocation and expansion could more than double the average attendance and corresponding annual impacts of the zoo, as reflected in these estimates.

Revenue Impacts

In addition to supporting jobs, labor income and output in the city and metro area, the new zoo could also create state and local tax revenues. All total, the concession sales at the zoo, plus offsite visitor spending, and employee spending could result in an estimated \$2.7 million in annual average state and local tax revenues, including \$1.6 million from non-local visitors, \$820,000 from on-site concessions and \$216,000 from employee spending.

Direct and Visitor Revenues

The Sacramento Zoological Society is a nonprofit organization and is exempt from property taxes and from sales tax on admissions, however



on-site concessions do generate taxable sales. Estimated state and local taxes from on-site concessions could total \$4.1 million over the first five years of operations in Elk Grove, including \$0.9 million in city sales taxes (Figure 7). (City sales tax includes Measure E.) There are also significant tax impacts associated with off-site visitor spending. These include transient lodging taxes generated by visitor hotel expenditures and sales taxes from off-site visitor expenditures for food, retail and entertainment. The estimated sum of sales and lodging taxes from visitors totals \$8.1 million over five years, including \$3.0 million to the city. The city lodging tax estimates assume that 75% of overnight visitors would stay in Elk Grove and include a 12% local lodging tax rate. Zoo employees could generate an estimated \$1.1 million in state and local sales taxes over five years from their household spending, a portion of which would be new as a result of the zoo expansion.

Attachment 10B: General Correspondence

Attachment 10B contains general correspondence concerning the proposed project. From October 2021 to May 2024, the City received over 300 comments, emails, and phone calls regarding the project. Among these communications, 285 individual names were documented expressing either support or opposition to the project, with a small number of neutral comments.

Approximately 5% of the feedback was **neutral**, consisting mainly of inquiries about the project, expressions of interest in job or volunteer opportunities, and requests for further information, which may not signify a stance of support or opposition.

Approximately 4% (12 comments) of the feedback was in **opposition** to the project, with individuals citing issues such as noise, odors, traffic, location, and apprehensions about what would happen to the existing zoo.

Approximately 91% (259 comments) of the feedback expressed support for the project.

It is important to note that the votes include input from both Elk Grove residents and non-residents. Additionally, the signatures from the organization letters of support included in Attachment 10A were not included in the final vote tally.

I'm writing on behalf of the Sacramento-Sierra Building and Construction Trades Council ("Council") in support of the City of Elk Grove ("City") Planning Commission ("Commission") Agenda Item 5 for the New Zoo at Elk Grove Project (Project No. SP0009) ("Project"). The Council urges the Commission to adopt a resolution recommending that the City Council certify the Environmental Impact Report for the Project and approve the entitlements required to construct the Project.

The Council represents more than 15,000 construction workers that live, work, and raise their families in the City of Elk Grove and the surrounding region and form the backbone of the region's skilled construction workforce. In addition, these unions participate in joint labor-management apprenticeship programs that include targeted outreach and community programs to recruit women and minority applicants, and to provide employment opportunities to veterans through the Helmets to Hardhats program.

The Council and its constituent unions have committed to ensuring that a local labor force is used to construct the Project, including providing priority dispatch to residents of Elk Grove, conducting career fairs to help Elk Grove residents enter the construction trades, and providing apprentice opportunities to Elk Grove residents.



A. Local Hire and Apprenticeship Commitments

The priority dispatch commitments by the unions include targets for hiring local workers which can give disadvantaged job seekers the opportunity to jump-start their careers and provide increased access to on-the-job training. Additionally, construction of the Project will result in the employment of apprentices from state-approved Joint Apprenticeship Training Programs. Each apprentice is a full-time worker who is receiving on-the-job training as an employee of a contractor on a jobsite. These programs create critical pathways for those pursuing careers in the skilled and trained construction industry and specifically aim to include women, and historically disadvantaged and minority communities, creating good-paying career opportunities for local residents, all while growing the highest skilled and trained workforce in the construction industry.

Finally, increasing the number of apprenticeship opportunities through construction of this Project enables pre-apprenticeship programs targeted to disadvantaged workers to place more workers into apprenticeships, and thus enables more women and disadvantaged workers to enter the pathway to a long-term, family-supporting career in construction.

B. Benefits to the Local Economy from Local Hire Commitments

The Council's local hire commitments will ensure that the millions of dollars spent on Project construction are put to work in the local economy—not shipped out of state, or even out of the region. Partnerships with local apprenticeship programs support middle class incomes that boost consumer spending—which creates additional jobs across all sectors of the economy.

According to the City's Economic Impact Analysis prepared for the Project, the total construction cost for the initial phase of the Project is \$302.3 million, including zoo facilities, soft costs and off-site infrastructure, of which, an estimated \$243.7 million of this construction spending could be captured locally. Furthermore, according to the Economic Impacts Analysis, the multiplier effect of \$243.7 million in local construction spending could result in a total increase in economic activity of \$425 million during the construction period, of which an estimated 58% could be captured on-site or elsewhere in the city of Elk Grove. The approximately 2,400 total jobs created by this construction project could result in \$170.9 million in labor income in the City and metro area during the construction

period.³ Through the unions' commitments to local hire, the dollars spent on this project will recirculate in the Elk Grove economy – creating even more jobs and economic value for the community.

Additionally, the operation of the Project will create good, middle-class jobs for City residents. Based on the Economic Impact Analysis prepared by the City, employment at the new facility is estimated at 140 to 144 people with an annual payroll of \$11 million to \$12 million and 75 to 80 third-party employees of food and retail concession operators with an annual payroll of \$3 million.⁴

C. Conclusion

Construction and operation of the Project will provide local career-pathway job opportunities and increased access to construction apprenticeships for under-represented groups and will create significant economic benefits for the City and its residents. The Sacramento-Sierra Building and Construction Trades Council respectfully requests that you adopt a resolution recommending City Council approval of the Project. Thank you for considering this letter.

Hello,

Thank you for your email. I'll try and address your questions. First, land south of Kammerer is not currently in the City, so pursuing a site there would require annexation, which is a multi-year process and requires approval by a regional agency, the Sacramento Local Agency Formation Commission. Water and sewer services have not been fully defined for that area either.

While a zoo is already allowed under the current zoning for the property with a conditional use permit, the City has also been working on an effort to re-envision this area with a more diverse and mixed range of land uses. You can read more about that effort under the Kammerer Road Urban Design Study.

We are working with the Sacramento Zoological Society in the preparation of a feasibility study, which will look at the construction and operating costs and potential revenue and funding sources. Funding the project is expected to be a partnership. Many of the roadways and other infrastructure to serve the site have been in the City's plans for some time.

Certain types of plants such as tree-ferns, ginkgo, and horsetail are known from the fossil record. Known as "living fossils", these plants lived in the time of the dinosaurs or earlier, but they are still alive today. If you can imagine a grove of these trees and plants, with a small nature trail winding through it, that would create a unique space that would be perfect for educational programs, school groups, or to simply experience what the Earth was like a long time ago.

Why at the zoo? Well, the current exhibit of animatronic dinosaurs is one of the most popular attractions at the zoo. A prehistoric garden would provide a perfect location for future animatronic dinosaur exhibits. Showing them in their natural habitat would add a whole new level and something that people can't experience anywhere else. Hi Eddie,

Thanks for reaching out and appreciate the question. A complete list of species has not been finalized, but there is a potential key species list in the <u>Feasibility Study</u> (see page 10 of the document, page 12 in the PDF). Lions are listed as part of the African Savannah, along with cheetahs.

You will notice that elephants are not listed and we do not anticipate including them in the new facility for a couple of reasons. First, given their size everything needed house them is also massive, and with that scale comes substantial construction cost. The current working cost estimate for the Phase 1 zoo is approximately \$175 million and it includes about 41 acres of habitat space for an extensive array of species. For comparison, the Oregon Zoo in Portland recently opened a new elephant habitat and it alone cost over \$50 million. Second, from an operations perspective it can take 3-4 times as much staff and support resources to care for elephants as it would other large species, such as giraffe and rhino.

We will be talking more about the design and range of species that could be at the zoo

later this summer, so be sure to sign up for the email list on the website to stay informed of upcoming events and activities.

Good afternoon,

Thank you for your email regarding the proposed zoo. The City has not made a definitive decision on the project and appreciates comments throughout the process. We will be investigating these concerns through the design and review process; for example, we are anticipating a buffer area to occur along Lotz Parkway near the existing residences.

Later this year we will be initiating an Environmental Impact Report for the project, which will look at topics including noise, odor, and safety. We may use other zoos as reference points for some of this analysis and encourage you to visit the neighborhood around the existing zoo to experience their current operations.

We appreciate your concerns about the area roadways, but I will note that many of the roadways in the area have been planned for major employment and visitor uses. Timing of improvements to the roads is alignment with the sequencing of development and availability of construction funds. Lotz Parkway is planned for further widening and extension to Whitelock Parkway in the coming years and West Stockton and Promenade Parkway realignments to Whitelock Parkway are also in design phase. Kammerer Road will be widened to a six-lane facility over time as funding becomes available and environmental review will be completed later this year for the extension to I-5. We will be conducting studies around traffic and circulation with the intent of directing zoo trips away from existing neighborhoods.

Regarding the Delta Shores area, this is a private development that is located in the City of Sacramento. The Elk Grove City limits end just north of the Laguna/I-5 interchange.

If you have other comments or questions please send them along as these will help us make sure we are addressing concerns throughout the design and review process.

Thank you for your email. The zoo is a very complex project. The schedule we have outlined involves development of the conceptual and schematic plans beginning this summer and continuing through 2023, at which point the City Council will consider the formal approvals. If the Council approves the project, we anticipate about 9-12 months to prepare the construction documents and bid the first phase for construction. The construction schedule is anticipated for another 18-24 months. At that point staff and the animals could start moving in and preparing for opening day. All told, we expect opening no sooner than summer 2027. There are several contingencies to that schedule, including securing the necessary funding from sponsors, donors, and partners, as well as the City.

Christopher: The one problem (issue) almost everybody has with VMT is that it comes from a black box and nobody knows how to challenge it. In the case of the zoo it is showing a significant and unavoidable impact, so who is going to challenge that. Trip reduction is only as good as the TDM program set up, the City monitoring the results and then having true financial penalties if the zoo is not meeting the trip reduction criteria. However, you may be in a situation where the zoo is more popular than expected and even with all the TDM measures working as planned, there is still a traffic problem. It is also interesting that in most other EIRs for other jurisdictions, while the VMT analysis is done for CEQA purposes, there is also the more traditional level of service, etc analysis done and evaluated for large projects based upon City general plan criteria. This allows the jurisdiction to determineI significant impacts, needed mitigations and funding estimates.I didn't see that for the zoo, but maybe I missed it. Probably the City did not want that information floating around since they will be the ones on the hook for funding these measures. I think this is why Darryl Steinberg in Sacramento came up with the CEQA VMT significance criteria when they were evaluating the impacts of the new arena downtown. I also didn't see any safety evaluation at the SR 99 interchange, which is a Caltrans CEQA requirement.

Finally, Ascent is a very good firm heading up the EIR. Have worked and peer reviewed their work many times and it has always been excellent. Kimley Horn for traffic can be good or bad. It just depends who they have working on the job.

Christopher: Thank you so much for the very quick and detailed response to my comment letter on the zoo that I sent yesterday. As with other contacts I have had with City staff (primarily the police department and their Citizens Academy), Elk Grove's service is levels above what I have seen from other jurisdictions. This is based on my 50 years of being a traffic and transportation engineer, completing almost 1000 projects in that time frame and attending and giving presentations at more public hearings than I care to think about.

I took a look at the traffic section and saw the usual "Significant and Unavoidable" designation for the VMT analysis. This is almost the standard transportation finding for City General Plans and large projects and is quickly overridden by City politicians. Didn't look to see how many others there were, but I'm assuming if there are any they will experience a similar fate.

I will send in my comment letter but two final thoughts.

The lack of trees and shade for both the visitors and the animals was a repeated complaint I saw for the Houston zoo. It is also going to be an issue for Elk Grove for maybe 10 + years until the trees are really starting to get big.

I have travelled to over 140 countries and seen more than 100 zoos around the world. There are good zoos and there are horrible zoos (like the one in Reno and most in third world countries). There is also controversy about the function of a zoo and what makes a good zoo versus a horrible zoo. I would not be surprised if you will be receiving numerous comment letters from the animal welfare organizations supporting their side of the issue (like there are too many animals in too small an area). Glad I don't have to respond to the comments.

Thank you for your email. The Draft EIR is <u>available today</u>. I encourage you to review that document and provide any comments on it that you may have. The comment period runs until February 20, 2024.

That said, I'll try and address your questions below.

1 Please provide a history of the quality of work provided by the selected zoo design team. A review of comments by residents going to zoos in other cities designed by this group had many complaints. In particular, lack of trees and shade for both humans and the animals. Houston is a good example.

SHR Studios, the design team selected for this project, has extensive experience with zoo and aquarium design and construction. Among their many projects include the Houston Zoo, Zoos Victoria, Nashville Zoo, Fresno Zoo, and Auckland Zoo. I direct you to their website for a more extensive list of their work history.

I cannot speak to the design decisions made by the other zoos you reference, but can say that a variety of design decisions have to be made throughout a project's design progression. It becomes a combination of animal care (the top priority), customer/guest experience, and overall project budget. For the proposed New Zoo in Elk Grove, we are aware of the lack of existing trees/shade across the site and are designing both landscaping and shade structures throughout the campus for both humans and animals. In fact, if you look at the <u>site plan</u> and some of the <u>sections</u> we presented in November 2023, you will see shade canopies and trellises integrated throughout the design, both for guests and the animals.

2. What animal welfare/animal protection organizations have been asked to participate in the design of the new zoo? Who is looking out for the animals in the zoo design? If none, please state why not.

The design is informed by the latest design protocols for zoological parks, including the standards of the US Department of Agriculture (a required permitting and inspection entity under Federal law and regulation) and the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA). Additionally, the animal care staff from the existing Zoo, along with medical care staff from the Zoo and UC Davis have been involved in habitat and holding facility design.

3. How much is parking going to cost?

The cost for visitors to park at the proposed Zoo has not been determined. We are looking at a number of models as part of the plan of finance and will have a specific

recommendation for the City Council later this spring.

4. Please provide figures showing existing and planned land uses at least a half mile away from all sides of the zoo. This would also include all pedestrian and bicycle access as well as the route of the proposed light rail extension.

The attached graphics show the City's latest approved General Plan land uses and Transportation Plan for the City. On the land use plan, the large green area at the northwest corner of Lotz Parkway and Kammerer Road is the site of the proposed Zoo; you can see the surrounding land uses from there.

On the Transportation Plan, the proposed light rail line is labeled as "Future High-Frequency Transit Alignment" and the stops are "High-Frequency Transit Stop." You will see one station immediately at the Zoo site. Bicycle and trail facilities are also shown on this map, including Class I and Class IV facilities around the north, east, and west sides of the site.

I'll also note that the City was awarded a State grant in late 2023 for updating of the Light Rail extension master plan. That work will get underway later this year.

5. Please provide a detailed description of how much outdoor space as well as indoor temperature controlled space will be provided for each animal group as well as the number of each species proposed.

I have this information broken down in a couple of places. First, Appendix C of the EIR lists the animal program, including their count and habitat size. Second, I'm attaching the Building Program summary for Phase 1A & 1B; this will describe the size of the holding areas for each of the habitats. You can then cross reference this with the another attachment, which is an excerpt of the Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing, Fire Protection, and Technology Engineering Basis of Design report. This document provides maps of the location of the buildings (by their ID number) and then describes the conditioning for each building.

6. Why was there no citizen's advisory committee formed during the design process?

The City already has several citizen's advisory committees that it takes projects to monthly. The Planning Commission will serve as the primary advisory committee responsible for assessing the design aspects, prior to Council's consideration. Additionally, input has been solicited from the Trails Committee and Art Commission, leveraging their respective subject matter expertise. It is noteworthy that the City traditionally does not convene specific advisory committees for individual projects, as existing advisory committees are well-equipped and trained to comprehensively review such matters. Nevertheless, the City recognizes the significance of surpassing the conventional approach of soliciting input predominately from existing advisory

committees or commissions, especially on larger projects. In pursuit of thorough public engagement, extensive outreach initiatives have been undertaken. The design process has incorporated project-specific outreach efforts, encompassing the following for the current project:

- Outreach events at the 2022 4th of July event at Elk Grove Park and the 2022 Multicultural Festival at District 56
- A neighborhood BBQ in the Sterling Meadows neighborhood (directly east of the site) in July 2022
- Community open houses and presentations in August 2022 and November 2023
- Presentations at various community groups, including but not limited to, Rotary Club meetings, Chamber of Commerce, EGUSD staff meetings, Al Misbaah, Civic Summer program, and Del Webb/Glenbrooke.
- Community surveys in 2022

This feedback has informed design decisions throughout the effort and is augmented with the programing needs for the Project, animal care requirements and best practices, and operations and maintenance considerations. Please also note there are still numerous opportunities for public comment at the upcoming public hearings.

The EIR is incomplete and therefore inaccurate...

The city and its consultant decided to perform a health risk impact assessment as part of its EIR for the zoo. The report is incomplete and therefore inaccurate and should include the neglected items indicated below.

Cancer plays second fiddle to heart and lung diseases...

Appendix E of the report contains a five page explanation of an additional 360 page core data dump. Unfortunately, the report only addresses the acute stage of exposure to toxic air contaminants during construction of the zoo; it does not explain the chronic additional toxic exposures due to 1.1-1.6 millions individuals driving cars each year to visit the zoo. Additionally, the report only looks at deaths due to cancer, which are more than two and a half times the level permitted by law. Unmitigated construction techniques and processes will result in many more cancer deaths for our community. Cancer competes with heart and lung diseases as the number one cause of death in the United States; in fact, heart disease is number one, and lung disease is number four.

This appendix makes no mention of increases in such diseases as congestive heart failure, chronic obstructive lung disease, asthma, emphysema, and interaction with other, complicating co-morbid conditions such as viral and bacterial infectious ailments.

Cars suck air 80 to 400 times faster than human beings...

Realize that at rest a human being consumes about 5-10 liters of air per minute; a two-liter engine idling at 800 revolutions per minute consumes 800 liters of air per minute, or about 80 to 160 times more than a human being. While cruising at 2,000 revolutions per minute, the two liter internal combustion engine takes in air 200 to 400 times faster than a human being. Violent, exploding suburbs...

The city has had a reputation of rampant development as evidenced by the explosive population growth since incorporation in 2000. Neighboring cities, such as Rancho Cordova and Folsom, have the same intentions to build until they explode. Most of that development here and there takes shape as single family dwellings which defy public transit planning and implementation. We are in for more global warming, flooding in the valley, increases in heart and lung chronic diseases, not to mention gridlock on our streets.

Pave paradise, put up a parking lot...

Ten acres of this 65 acre project is committed to automobile parking. Two lots are mentioned, one paved with asphalt, the other with gravel. The zoo plan expects 1.6M visits each year; that would be over 4,300 visitors a day, every day. With 1,700 parking spaces in both lots, each car must carry at least three visitors each day every day of the year in each parking space. How much pollution each car will deposit into the atmosphere is not mentioned in the report. The math just doesn't add up.

CEQA sets a higher bar than that met by the city and its contractor...

VMT impacts human health and the natural environment. Human health is impacted as increases in vehicle travel lead to more vehicle crashes, poor air quality, increases in chronic disease associated with reduced physical activity, and worse mental health. Increases in vehicle travel also negatively affect other road users, including pedestrians, cyclists, other motorists, and many transit users. The natural environment is impacted as higher VMT leads to more collisions with wildlife and fragments habitat. Additionally, development that leads to more vehicle travel also tends to consume more energy, water, and open space (including farmland and sensitive habitat). This increase in impermeable surfaces raises the flood risk and pollutant transport into waterways.

I am writing to express my earnest disapproval for the proposed New Zoo project in Elk Grove. As a 45-year resident of our city, I believe a new zoo in Elk Grove would constitute a decided burden to our city and its residents, as well as a grievous loss to our downtown Sacramento.

I was raised and reside in Valley Hi Country Club Estates in West Elk Grove. I have witnessed unchecked growth in my lifetime, to the extent that Elk Grove feels ever less recognizable to me. For decades now, developments touted as progress have amounted to the destruction of our natural landscape and wildlife habitats (including monumental, native oaks, pasture and wetlands), to housing sprawl and retail projects that engulf our local topography and devour any unique, regional character, and most dramatically, unmatched population increase.

I have watched my hometown balloon from a quiet community of 14,000 to an overrun city, whose residents largely depend on long commutes to Sacramento. With all this growth have come big city problems: Vagrants roam our streets, traffic congestion now typically detains motorists for multiple stoplight cycles at our intersections, burglaries are a regular occurrence in my neighborhood. There appears to be no end to Elk Grove's development in sight. It seems to me only

a matter of time till our region resembles the worst of the Hwy 101 corridor on the Bay Area's Peninsula: An inextricable string of towns paved and packed together---with Elk Grove bleeding into Galt and into Lodi and Stockton and beyond---in precisely the same fashion that San Jose, Santa Clara, Sunnyvale, Cupertino, and Redwood City, to name a few, all run together in an indistinguishable heap of asphalt.

Simply put, the last thing Elk Grove needs is more. Our city desperately needs to draw breath, at last, after decades of expansion at times so feverish we wore the mantle of "fastest growing city" in the nation. Traffic alone on our streets is already unbearable; we would invite more from miles around?

Additionally, my family has resided in the city of Sacramento for 5 generations. My parents grew up steps from our current, beloved zoo, listening as children each night from their beds to the roar of lions and chatter of monkeys. The removal of our dear zoo to from the city center aggrieves me. Good evening members of the Planning Commission,

I am writing today to voice my **full support** for the Elk Grove Zoo Project being reviewed in front of the Planning Commission tomorrow, April 4, 2024. I am in support of the Planning Commission recommending approval of the project to the Elk Grove City Council. *I do have a concern regarding Bilby Road that I detail further below.*

As a young adult resident of Elk Grove who grew up in the City and went through the Elk Grove Unified School District system, I believe that this is an excellent opportunity not only to provide valuable, unique education to young people in the City, but also a wonderful addition filling in the massive gap of entertainment in the City to the city's youths. One of the biggest complaints I and my peers had growing up in Elk Grove is that there is "nothing to do in Elk Grove." It felt like there was nothing else to do but eating and shopping. This project adds an amazing opportunity for leisure and fun for local students and youths that currently is scant within the city limits. During my time as a member of the Elk Grove Youth Commission a few years ago, it was a reoccurring concern at outreach events that there were few events and activities in the City for youth.

When reviewing the project, I did have one concern that I would like to see addressed in the plans for the project. From my understanding of the Site Plan, it appears that Bilby Road will end at Lotz Parkway on the east side of the zoo and will not be continuous with the other planned section of Bilby Road on the west side of the zoo.

This change will be a departure from the "Master Plan of Roadways" identified in Figure CI-2 of the Circulation Element of the General Plan. The current Circulation Element depicts Bilby Road as being a 4-lane arterial road connecting straight from Bruceville Road to Promenade Parkway. I believe that the City has provided ample other road access (Kyler Road) and bicycle/pedestrian access (Shed C pedestrian trail) options of going around the portion of Bilby Road that will be removed by the zoo. However, this will create a situation where there will be three segments of noncontinuous roads, all named Bilby Road.

Bilby Road's three segments are, from east to west are:

- A segment from Franklin Blvd to Willard Parkway shared with the unincorporated County
- A segment from Willard Parkway to the east side of the zoo/Shed C
- A segment from Lotz Parkway on the west side of the zoo to Promenade Parkway

Given that the segment of Bilby Road between Lotz and Promenade will be completely disconnected from the other segments of Bilby (with no clear link around the zoo), it can be confusing to motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists when these sections of Bilby do not meet together. It can also be confusing such that it can cause a safety issue.

When someone calls 9-1-1 for help and says that they are on Bilby Road, it can cause potential issues with sending emergency services when the road is disconnected and in three parts. Further, per Section 12.26.036.A of the Elk Grove Municipal Code (EGMC), street names that are "already in use within the City" are prohibited from being used again. If this segment of Bilby will be permanently disconnected from the other parts of Bilby, it can be effectively argued that this segment is essentially another street that should have its own, new name. I request that the Public Works Director (who is delegated the power to rename streets per EGMC 12.26.042), Planning Commission, and City Council explore potentially renaming this segment of Bilby Road as a part of conditions of approval of this project or future actions related to the zoo. I believe that it is especially timely to rename it at this time as there are no buildings along that segment of Bilby Road that are addressed to Bilby Road at this time.

Some ideas that come to mind to rename that section based on its location, and general practices in the City, include:

- Renaming it to "Sky River Parkway" to match the name of the street to the east of Promenade Parkway
- Renaming it to a musical instrument or musical themed street to match the surrounding neighborhoods (ex: Orchestra Way, Trumpet Way, Chord Drive)
- Renaming it to something related to the area or function of the zoo where the road will terminate (ex: Veterinarian Drive, Animal Care Way, Lemur Drive)
- Renaming it to honor a Veteran who is listed in the City's database of eligible Veterans pursuant to EGMC 12.26.034

I hope that the City will be able to explore and accommodate this concern and I look forward to seeing progress being made on the zoo.

I appreciate your time reading this and ask that you support the Zoo project for the City of Elk Grove. My name is John Hershey and I am the Compliance Officer for UA Local 447 Plumbers and Pipefitters covering Sacramento, Yolo, Amador, El Dorado, Placer, and Nevada counties. I myself have completed the plumbing and pipefitting apprenticeship in part due to the on the job training hours provided by major publicly funded projects.

Projects like relocating the Sacramento Zoo to the new location at Kammerer road create the demand for apprentices that sustain the skilled and trained workforce in our region. With the 769 estimated direct construction jobs for Phase 1A, and a conservative estimate of 1 out of every 6 workers being an apprentice, this provides the on the job training opportunities for nearly 130 apprentices who are just starting their careers or who are near the point of becoming successful skilled and trained journeyworkers.

These apprentices are future home buyers, family raisers, and the backbone of the next generation of the local construction workforce. Additionally, a union journey level construction worker in our area can expect anywhere from \$90,000 to \$130,000 gross income with full time work and only a High School diploma or GED depending on their craft.

With reference to the Economic and Revenue Impact Analysis that was prepared for the city, the increase of economic activity by \$338.6 million during the course of construction of Phases 1 and 2 is nothing to ignore. With nearly 80% of that activity being captured locally, is just the thing a growing city needs. Coming off the heels of the Sky River Casino a stones throw away from the proposed zoo location, Elk Grove could become a focal point of local and regional tourism and recreation. As the economic center of gravity continues to move in Elk Grove's direction, it stands to reason that marquee projects like the moving of the zoo from Sacramento to Elk Grove will continue this trend.

Aside from purely economic matters; things like all electric construction and improved animal welfare by more than quadrupling the acreage speak to concerns about the climate and animal welfare.

Again, I would like to thank you for reading this and considering my input and ask that the Planning Commission support this project.

I would like to inform the committee of my whole-hearted support for the Sacramento Zoo's proposed move to Elk Grove. I am an Elk Grove resident in 95624. I am also a family member of a long benefactor and former volunteer of the Zoo.

For decades, the Sacramento Zoo has attempted to negotiate expanding their footprint within Sacramento City. Sacramento City has failed to see the benefit of having a zoo. I am sure, with flashy sports teams, a zoo seems like an antiquated form of entertainment. However, I have received multiple presentations from the Zoo over a decade regarding their plans. It changes slightly depending on the location, the

economic environment, and the City/Zoo leadership teams. However, the presentations I have seen for Elk Grove and this current Zoo leadership are exciting and I believe the integration of the Zoo into the culture and lifestyle of Elk Grove, and the Zoo's future plans for education and conservation would be a huge benefit to Elk Grove. It would help Elk Grove draw in more taxpayer funding (via tourism, visitors, and sales tax) in addition to assisting the local community/economy with jobs. Furthermore, these jobs offer career futures far beyond simple service industries, such as janitors, food service, or fast food. Jobs initially offered by the project, of course, include the construction and infrastructure. However, future jobs with the zoo include biological, veterinary, other animal sciences, along with education and outreach positions.

Frankly, I have not set foot in the Sky River Casino yet. I hate gambling and I am not a fan of smoking. But, I will be at the Zoo often, if not weekly, for their special events. Also, with the number of schools in Elk Grove (and families who move to Elk Grove specifically because of our excellent school district), there will be a substantial amount of family patronage at the Sacramento Zoo should it move here.

I lived in Elk Grove long before it became an incorporated city. We have seen substantial commercial and residential development. I miss the old "cow town" feel of the community I grew up in. But, if we are going to lose ranch land and our beautiful open fields in Elk Grove, then I'd rather lose it to the Sacramento Zoo, who has been a staple in our county for decades.

Please keep in mind, some citizens will object to the Zoo on a basis of animal cruelty, stating the animals in the Zoo should be free in the wild. I am sure the Zoo has explained to the Planning Committee that their animals have all been born in captivity. The Sacramento Zoo is not a sanctuary zoo, like the City of Folsom Zoo is. The animals have never been in the wild and could not survive if released. Additionally, Sacramento Zoo could not maintain their Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) accreditation if the animals were not properly cared for, nor would they ever be allowed to run breeding programs for zoo animals. Sacramento Zoo has worked hard to maintain their AZA accreditation and has coordinated breeding programs for various animals, including the thick-billed parrots. The details of their planned move to Elk Grove show the care and consideration the Sacramento Zoo has for the community in Elk Grove and the animals in their charge. Comments regarding the general animal cruelty of zoos or the smell of animals are merely short-sighted and ignorant (especially considering much of Elk Grove was farming and ranching land). The Sacramento Zoo can bring culture and education to our community to combat these arguments, along with a greater understanding of ecosystems, climate systems, and exposure to animals you can only find over half a

world away.

Please, bring the Sacramento Zoo to Elk Grove! Thank you for your time.





I'm writing on behalf of the Sacramento-Sierra Building and Construction Trades Council ("Council") in support of the City of Elk Grove ("City") Planning Commission ("Commission") Agenda Item 5 for the New Zoo at Elk Grove Project (Project No. SP0009) ("Project"). The Council urges the Commission to adopt a resolution recommending that the City Council certify the Environmental Impact Report for the Project and approve the entitlements required to construct the Project.

The Council represents more than 15,000 construction workers that live, work, and raise their families in the City of Elk Grove and the surrounding region and form the backbone of the region's skilled construction workforce. In addition, these unions participate in joint labor-management apprenticeship programs that include targeted outreach and community programs to recruit women and minority applicants, and to provide employment opportunities to veterans through the Helmets to Hardhats program.

The Council and its constituent unions have committed to ensuring that a local labor force is used to construct the Project, including providing priority dispatch to residents of Elk Grove, conducting career fairs to help Elk Grove residents enter the construction trades, and providing apprentice opportunities to Elk Grove residents.

A. Local Hire and Apprenticeship Commitments

The priority dispatch commitments by the unions include targets for hiring local workers which can give disadvantaged job seekers the opportunity to jump-start their careers and provide increased access to on-the-job training. Additionally, construction of the Project will result in the employment of apprentices from state-approved Joint Apprenticeship Training Programs. Each apprentice is a full-time worker who is receiving on-the-job training as an employee of a contractor on a jobsite. These programs create critical pathways for those pursuing careers in the skilled and trained construction industry and specifically aim to include women, and historically disadvantaged and minority communities, creating good-paying career opportunities for local residents, all while growing the highest skilled and trained workforce in the construction industry.

Finally, increasing the number of apprenticeship opportunities through construction of this Project enables pre-apprenticeship programs targeted to disadvantaged workers to place more workers into apprenticeships, and thus enables more women and disadvantaged workers to enter the pathway to a long-term, family-supporting career in construction.

B. Benefits to the Local Economy from Local Hire Commitments

The Council's local hire commitments will ensure that the millions of dollars spent on Project construction are put to work in the local economy—not shipped out of state, or even out of the region. Partnerships with local apprenticeship programs support middle class incomes that boost consumer spending—which creates additional jobs across all sectors of the economy.

According to the City's Economic Impact Analysis prepared for the Project, the total construction cost for the initial phase of the Project is \$302.3 million, including zoo facilities, soft costs and off-site infrastructure, of which, an estimated \$243.7 million of this construction spending could be captured locally.\(^1\)
Furthermore, according to the Economic Impacts Analysis, the multiplier effect of \$243.7 million in local construction spending could result in a total increase in economic activity of \$425 million during the construction period, of which an estimated 58% could be captured on-site or elsewhere in the city of Elk Grove.\(^2\) The approximately 2,400 total jobs created by this construction project could result in \$170.9 million in labor income in the City and metro area during the construction

period.³ Through the unions' commitments to local hire, the dollars spent on this project will recirculate in the Elk Grove economy – creating even more jobs and economic value for the community.

Additionally, the operation of the Project will create good, middle-class jobs for City residents. Based on the Economic Impact Analysis prepared by the City, employment at the new facility is estimated at 140 to 144 people with an annual payroll of \$11 million to \$12 million and 75 to 80 third-party employees of food and retail concession operators with an annual payroll of \$3 million.⁴

C. Conclusion

Construction and operation of the Project will provide local career-pathway job opportunities and increased access to construction apprenticeships for under-represented groups and will create significant economic benefits for the City and its residents. The Sacramento-Sierra Building and Construction Trades Council respectfully requests that you adopt a resolution recommending City Council approval of the Project. Thank you for considering this letter.

My name is Amanda Nelson and I am writing to you today to express my unwavering support for the proposed new zoo project in Elk Grove. Although I am not an Elk Grove resident, I am a Sacramento native, born and raised. I understand the importance of this project and the great things it will bring to our community. The economic impact alone will be incredible, but also the education, conservation, and recreational activities this project will bring are extraordinary.

Three years ago, I became a member of the Sacramento Zoo. As a nature and wildlife photographer, my goal was simple. It was an opportunity to take photos of the animals and do something different from time to time by visiting. What I didn't anticipate was how I would find so much more. I'd like to take a few moments of your time to share some of the experiences I have had while being a member of the Sacramento Zoo.

- The Photos I never visit the zoo now without my camera. The amount of images I have of all of the animals is in the thousands. I can spend hours to entire days walking around, capturing their personalities. Whether it's our 18 year old lioness, Cleo lounging in the sun or Indah the orangutan stealing all the veggies and wearing a potato sack hat. I never expected I would know the animal's names and learn so much about them. Anyone who knows me knows my love for the big cats, especially the lions. When our beloved Kamau passed away last summer, I was heartbroken. While terribly sad, the bond formed with employees and docents was something special. Which leads into my next point.
- The People I have come to know some of the employees and docents at the zoo. I cannot emphasize enough how incredibly passionate these humans are about what they do every day. The back office staff, the zoo-keepers and the docents all work to make sure each guest has an experience that is special and unique as well making sure the animals are happy and healthy. It's not a secret there is some criticism in the community about the current zoo. It's small, it's outdated, etc. Whenever I have heard someone bring this up, the sentiment is all the same. Our zoo is tiny but mighty. Those words couldn't be any more true. And while Land Park holds so much nostalgia, especially for those of us who have lived here our whole lives, we know it's time to grow.
- The Conservation Becoming a member, I knew about endangered species. But I never really knew the role zoos played in helping conserve those species that are facing extinction. I have learned about the Species Survival Plan and the role it plays in why animals move to different zoos. From an outsider's perspective, moving the chimpanzees for example, may have seemed like a knee jerk reaction, but moves such as those are years in the making. And they ensure these animals will continue to be on our planet for years and decades to come. I also learned about an amazing organization called AAZK (American Association of Zoo Keepers). I learned I could become a member, even though I am not a zoo keeper. This year, I proudly became an official member of our Greater Sacramento Chapter. Just like the zoo, our group is tiny but mighty and made up of zoo employees and docents. Together, we hope to spread awareness further and raise money for conservation efforts.
- The Experiences There is a whole array of experiences the zoo offers, that anyone can participate in. Since becoming a member, I have fed giraffes both during public feedings and on a behind the scenes tour. I have attended after-hours happy hours and member only nights, where you feel like you have the whole place to yourself. And my personal favorite, the overnight safari, complete with sleeping on the lawn and listening to the owls, lions and any other creature that wants to speak up in the middle of the night.

I could go on and on about all of the reasons I love the zoo. I also know how crucial this project is both in conserving the zoo and also for our community. Being able to be home to the first modern zoo to be built in the country in over 30 years, will be remarkable. The economic impact, notoriety and tourism this will bring is extraordinary. I volunteered with the zoo at the Elk Grove Multicultural Festival last year as well as the Farm to Fork Festival to talk to the community about this project. We were met with an incredibly positive and excited response from the community.

As a resident of Sacramento, I would like to thank the City of Elk Grove for stepping up to support this project when the City of Sacramento would not. I hope you will continue to receive letters like mine sharing the love and memories that exist in regards to the zoo. I appreciate beyond words your consideration of the relocation and expansion of the zoo. I look forward to attending the final vote on May 8th.

I am writing to voice my strong disagreement with the New Zoo project.

This project is a poorly conceived move with the mindset of growth for growth's sake. As frequent visitors to the zoo over a number of years, myself and my peers agree that we would not visit the zoo in a new location, and do not see the value of enormous expansion.

The current zoo possesses a number of advantages that would be lost in a new location. First, it is readily accessible to Sacramento and surrounding-area residents and an easy choice for field trips, extracurricular events (such as summer camps) and sponsored visits through Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, and other club organizations.

Second, it shares proximity with several other long established destinations for family outings -- Fairytale Town, Funderland and greater Land Park, which augments visitors to all of these destinations and makes for an attractive day out.

Third, its presence in the same location for a century has resulted in a beautiful and appealing shade canopy of mature trees and other landscaping, allowing for visits on even the hottest days of the summer.

We love our zoo. It is a manageable size that is easy for children of all ages to navigate. In our literally hundreds of visits over the years, I have never heard another visitor complain that the zoo is too small or that there are not enough large animals. In fact, I have often heard families saying, "This zoo is a great size." "It's so easy to do this as a day trip." "This zoo is wonderful for kids."

I do not know anyone who supports the New Zoo project, or is enthusiastic about the zoo's plans to move. Particularly with the San Francisco Zoo and the Oakland Zoo in such close proximity, a relocated and expanded Sacramento Zoo seems unnecessary and likely to be under-utilized.

We want to see the zoo continue doing what it has done so well -- focus on beauty, accessibility, and community involvement. Showcase a diverse range of small and medium sized animals for conservation. Cultivate the long running partnership with the UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine that is also such a learning opportunity for the community. It is for these reasons that I write to oppose the New Zoo project.

My name is Sally Nies, and I live in West Sacramento. The Sacramento Zoo has always been a part of my life. I grew up in Redding, CA, and coming down to the "big city" of Sacramento was always a special visit. The zoo was always a desired destination, and I was always excited to see all the animals. I even visited with my college friends, and I truly feel it helped contribute to my passion of animal care and welfare. I am now a Registered Veterinary Technician, working in Davis for the last 10 years, and I regularly bring my 5-year-old daughter to the Sacramento Zoo. She also loves the zoo, and her favorite exhibits are the giraffe, the meerkats, the reptile/amphibian house, and the cheetah.

Since hearing of the possible new location and expansion of the Sacramento Zoo, I have been so excited and following the progress of this project closely. The current location of the Sacramento Zoo, while conveniently located downtown, needs significant updates to provide for the animals located there and to accommodate the number of visitors needed to maintain its current business.

As a veterinary professional, it is extremely important to me that zoos and aquariums meet high regulatory standards of animal care. The hospitals I manage are accredited by the American Animal Hospital Association, and this designation demonstrates our commitment to these high standards of care. Likewise, the Association of Zoos and Aquariums also sets regulatory standards to promote animal welfare and conservation standards. It is important to me that the Sacramento Zoo maintain their accredited status, showing that they meet these high standards.

Many larger animals need specific space and social requirements to maintain a healthy status and welfare. Some animals currently located at the Sacramento Zoo barely meet their enrichment requirements, specifically the large apes and giraffes. Watching the zoo lose species, such as the Chimpanzee, because they are unable to meet these standards has been heartbreaking because I know the staff there care so deeply about these animals and want to share them with the public. A larger zoo, with the ability to meet these requirements, will provide better care for the current animals located at the zoo, and expand the opportunity for other large species. This in turn creates opportunity for education and conservation efforts desperately needed for large species, such as rhinoceros, giraffe, large apes, and large felines. The Sacramento Zoo could become a haven of conservation, and provide additional aid in the fight to save endangered species.

The Sacramento Zoo is already a go-to when visiting the Sacramento area. A new and larger zoo, able to accommodate large, popular species, will provide many income and education opportunities to the local area.

The zoo already partners with the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital at UC Davis. They also provide on-site learning to several local elementary schools and students. It is also one of the locations I recommend for volunteer work to obtain animal care and handling experience when looking for a prospective job in veterinary medicine. A larger location will expand upon these educational opportunities, and create a greater learning experience for these students. As my daughter is in elementary school now, I am very interested in the programs they develop at this new location, to provide animal welfare and conversation knowledge to her and her classmates.

A large zoo in the Elk Grove Region will create many new employment positions and bring jobs to the area. It will also provide incentive for business creation and growth in the zoo area, such as shops and restaurants, who will be able to grow their businesses with the income from the tourism the zoo would bring.

So, I am asking you to please support the relocation and expansion of the Sacramento Zoo to the Elk Grove region, so the Sacramento area can become a better partner in animal welfare and conservation, and education for future generations.

Recently posted on *Elk Grove News* was an excerpt from Elk Grove Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen passionately expounding on the importance of local control. (Click on link to view her comments.) I totally agree which is why, back in 2000, voters decided Elk Grove must become a city so that "We the people" control our city's destiny.

What is at the heart of local control? Empower Missouri states, "The heart of the principle of local control is that the people who are closest to an issue should make the decisions related to that issue because they generally have the most information about the topic."

That is never truer today regarding the possible relocation of the Sacramento Zoo to Elk Grove. While an admirable goal, one question remains, "What do, 'We the people' want"?

The only way to get the definitive answer to that important question is to put the question up to a vote of the people of Elk Grove.

Given the enormous cost factor – over \$300 million for the first phase – shouldn't the people of Elk Grove decide if we want to take on such a debt. Yes, it is nice the city is holding public meetings.

The Sacramento Zoo has been a cherished destination for families, the local Sacramento community, and visitors from neighboring states for nearly 100 years. It has provided momentous connections between people, animals, and nature through education and advocacy on the protection and conservation of wildlife locally and globally. Sentiments and attachments to the location and animals have kept the 14.6-acre not-for-profit zoo running, but only under jeopardizing conditions. The wildlife/captive animals of the zoo need to relocate to Elk Grove into an expanded and modernized facility to meet their animal welfare requirements, and those of the future animals to be housed.

In 1997, the zoo's accreditation was challenged by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) due to outdated infrastructure, limited spacing, and inadequate staffing. For decades, the City of Sacramento has been searching for a new location that will be able to accommodate the increased space requirement for the animals they already have, such as giraffes, lions, and zebras. A feasibility study was finalized in 2022, on the proposed 100 acres in Elk Grove, that assessed all objectives for the relocation and proved it can provide sufficient space and capability to care for and manage a diverse wildlife population.

Animals that people love to see like the tiger, hippopotamus, and grizzly bear will never be a part of this zoo unless they improve the physical limitation of the current site. The new zoo location would be able to create habitats that are more realistic to an animal's natural habitats out in the wild. This would allow for new wildlife to be added and an increased focus on conservation of species such as the clouded leopards and various apes. The Sacramento Zoo had to send away four chimpanzees due to having too small of a habitat which usually calls for housing eight together. There are fewer accredited zoos that can take in new animals or accommodate them for breeding, making it challenging to increase our repopulation efforts of wildlife that are endangered.

The psychological health and well-being of the captive animals is another important factor to address in their current location. With the space restriction and archaic infrastructure, the animal's quality of life is diminished. The Oakland Zoo and Detroit Zoo have worked hard to minimize stress in their animals to help their overall quality of life. The Oakland Zoo implemented larger enclosures that are more relaxing for the animals and have educators set out to inform the public that the less stressed the animal is, the more likely they will be seen doing natural behaviors. The Detroit Zoo takes pride in focusing on animals that belong in colder climates or environments that can thrive well in their weather, and by keeping social animals together, not isolated, or solitary species in uncrowded conditions to minimize stress. Furthermore, relocating to Elk Grove will provide access to larger outdoor spaces that would facilitate natural behaviors and provide areas for more social animals, thus alleviating stress and improving their well-being.

Concerns about ongoing logistical and financial challenges have been on the rise, but they are being discussed and worked on together by the Sacramento Zoological Society and the City of Elk Grove with the animal's health and welfare at the forefront. This should not prevent the relocation process, and in fact they are encouraging the community to ask questions and be a part of this new potential change. Become informed about the importance of zoos and wildlife conservation and support this opportunity for the Sacramento Zoo to expand so that the wildlife/captive animals can thrive.

THE NEW ZOO AT ELK GROVE (SP0009)

Establishment of a Special Planning Area and Rezoning, Amendment to the Bicycle, Pedestrian, And Trails Master Plan; Conditional Use Permit; Tentative Subdivision Map with Subdivision Design Review; District Development Plan; Level 1 Design Review; Art Plan; Consistency With The General Plan For Inclusion In The Capital Improvement Program; Financing Terms:

The proposed Project, The New Zoo at Elk Grove, involves the construction of a new zoological park and associated facilities and activities on an approximately 103-acre site at the northwest corner of Kammerer Road and Lotz Parkway.

The zoological park would include various facilities and buildings to be developed in phases. The main facility would be on approximately 65 acres and would be designed to support an average annual attendance of between 1.1 and 1.6 million visitors. The facility would be organized into four primary zones: Green Corridor, Africa, California, and Australasia. The Green Corridor would be the main pedestrian pathway through the New Zoo. Components included in the Project include:

- Adoption of a new Zoological Park Special Planning Area to establish zoning regulations (development standards, allowed uses, required permits), and rezoning of the site.
- Amendment of the Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails Master Plan to reflect the updated pedestrian and bicycle facilities around the Project.
- A Conditional Use Permit for the operation of a zoological park. Components and features include, but are not limited to, the keeping of animals and insects, veterinary care, educational activities, food and beverage service (inclusive of alcohol service, including limited on-site brewing of beer), retail sales, administrative offices, caretaker's quarters, greenhouses/gardens/nurseries, and warehousing and storage of goods and materials for on-site usage. This also includes overnight accommodations (including hotel/motel and patron/guest camping) and special events and programs where the facilities are either provided as a special ticketed event or are available for rent.
- A tentative subdivision map to subdivide the site into seven parcels and to set aside public right-of-way for public streets and other utilities, as well as the dedication of easements for public utilities.
- A District Development Plan, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, establishing the overall site plan, parking/access/circulation, and major components of the Project.
- Level 1 Design Review, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, approving building design and architecture for the Entry Complex, Giraffe Café/Lodge, and Animal Care Center/Nutrition Center/Gelada Café.
- An Art Plan, as required by the Zoological Park Special Planning Area, providing a
 process for integration of public art into the Project, including establishing a budget for
 the purchase and installation of art and the process to solicit, select, and install the
 artwork.
- Determination that the Project is consistent with the General Plan for listing in the City's Capital Improvement Program.

The Planning Commission reviewed this matter at its regular meeting on April 4, 2024, and voted 5-0 to recommend approval to the City Council.


