Roundabouts are just another safe intersection. They are different than traffic signals or stop signs because they use their circular shape and yield signs to control traffic.




Enjoy the many activities in this workbook while you learn about "Roundabouts, Another Safe Intersection."



## Lesson 2: SIGNS in the Roundabout

	Name of Sign	Description
$\bigcirc$	School Zone	Alerts drivers they are approaching a school area and must slow down (Hint: pentagon shaped).
$\bigcirc$	Yield	Requires motorists to slow or stop to avoid other vehicles at an intersection (Hint: triangular shaped).
$\bigcirc$	Circular Intersection	Warns drivers they are approaching a circular intersection (Hint: chasing arrows).
$\bigcirc$	Pedestrian Crossing	Alerts drivers of pedestrian crossing (Hint: shows exactly where a pedestrian should cross).
$\bigcirc$	Yield Ahead	Warns drivers there is a yield ahead (Hint: square sign).
$\bigcirc$	One Way	Requires travel in one direction only (Hint: the arrow points the way).







  - \_\_\_\_ Wait for drivers to stop.



## Lesson 4: Bikes, Make Safe Choices!

bikes are important vehicles at roundabouts. There are special exit ramps for  $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{v}}$  bikers that lead onto the sidewalk. Sidewalks can be crowded, so ride or walk slowly to the Scrosswalk. Be polite and give 🎢 pedestrians the right of way. Don't run into  $\operatorname{Grandma}_{\mathcal{L}}$  Grandma or baby brother stroller. Cross with your OND bike at in his crosswalk just like a Appedestrian. the  $\leq$ 1. Make sure drivers to see you-make eye contact! 2. Wait for drivers to STOP Stop. step off the curb when traffic is stopped. A good reason to walk your Ovo bike in the crosswalk is so drivers will have time to 🕽 see you.





# **Round the Roundabout**

Drive round around a roundabout Be safe; one lane or two. Stay in the lane that you arrive Go straight, go left or U.

A roundabout is just an intersection With a curve. Drive round around a roundabout Choose safely all to serve.

The traffic in the roundabout Has got the right of way. No stop signs round a roundabout Just yield to them, OK?

Don't crash into the other car. Don't cross the middle line. Just drive around the roundabout And exit when it's time.

You walk around a roundabout. Don't cross across, not you! And on a bike, just exit right You use the crosswalk, too!


Drive round around a roundabout. Be safe, you have a choice. Just use your head, do what we said And travel safe—rejoice! Drive slow around a roundabout It's made that way you see, Just travel slow, get where you go, It's safe for you and me!


The roundabout is safer than A traffic light, it's true! If your choice not right, And bump you might, Injuries are few.

When trucks drive round a roundabout They go one at a time. The apron helps them circulate -They get to cross the lines.




Drive round around a roundabout Slow down, slow down, my friend. From here, from there, from everywhere We'll roundabout again.





# Roundabouts Lesson Plan Summary

### Lesson 1 · Basic Terminology

Introduce the following basic terminology:

- Sidewalk
- Crosswalk
- Bike Lane
- Bike Lane Exit
- Pedestrian Safety Zone (splitter island)

#### Key Concepts

- Use the bike lane but exit to the sidewalk to get to the cross-walk
- Cross at the cross-walk
- Cross one direction of traffic at a time
- Cross to the Pedestrian Safety Zone (splitter island)

### Lesson 2 · Signs

Be able to identify:

- Yield sign
- Pedestrian Crossing Sign
- School Zone Sign
- Roundabout Ahead Sign (chasing arrows)
- One Way Sign

### Key concepts

- Pedestrian Crossing Sign requires drivers to stop for pedestrians in the cross-walk
- Yield sign requires drivers entering the roundabout to yield to drivers already in the roundabout
- One Way—Drive counter clockwise
- School Zone—drivers are required to travel less than 20 mph in a school zone.\*

### **Lesson 3 – Pedestrians**

Make Safe Choices when you cross the street at a roundabout.

#### Key Concepts

- Cross only at the cross-walk
- Use 3 steps to cross the street
  - 1. Make sure drivers see you—Make eye contact!
  - 2. Wait for drivers to stop.
  - 3. Step off curb when drivers are stopped.
- Cross one direction of traffic at a time (you can rest in the pedestrian safety zone/splitter island).

### Lesson 4 · Bikes

Make Safe Choices when you bike through a roundabout.

#### Key concepts

- Young bikers use the sidewalk to get to the crosswalk
- Don't ride fast on the sidewalk there can be elderly citizens, moms pushing strollers, etc.
- Cross at the crosswalk—walk your bike -drivers won't have time to react if you ride in the crosswalk.

### Lesson 5 – Emergency Vehicles – let them quickly through!

• Know where you are so you can be sure to get out of the way.

### Key Concepts

- Clear the intersection
- Pull over to the right and stop.

\* In some states it is 15 mph
